

We started the year with our pantomime **Sleeping Beauty** and now move on to a 'proper' play. This is the second Alan Ayckbourn play that we have presented in the last 18 months (or third, if you count **House and Garden** as two plays!).

We welcome back Di Jones to direct Chorus of Disapproval our Dramatic offering for this year, although the piece is often referred to as a play with music! Recently Di has directed Prime Time with Jean and Cyrano de Bergerac for us and we are grateful that she has found the time to direct another challenging show. Until recently Di has also run our regular Tuesday evening tap classes which were instigated after Stepping Out, when the cast enjoyed tap dancing so much, they begged for more!

This summer sees us touring again to the Minack Theatre, Cornwall during August with the aptly named **Gulliver's Travels**. This original musical written by two of our members, Chris Chambers and Andy Rapps, is based on all four of the stories in Jonathan Swift's book and promises to be an evening to remember. Directed by Julia Ascott, this new show has a huge cast, stunning original costumes and amazing special effects. We look forward to seeing you either here in Croydon or in Cornwall.

We are considering making a change to our autumn/winter schedule this year and one option is to produce a "Christmas Show" in early December instead of an autumn play and Christmas pantomime. The Beggar's Opera

The mounting of The Beggar's Opera on 29 June 1728 made John Gay celebrated and wealthy. This burlesque of Italian Opera exceeded all known receipts despite initial concerns of both theatre managers and audiences. With 62 consecutive performances, it became the longest running play in English stage history and went on to become the most performed text in the 18th century. The play depicts a world of thieves, pickpockets and prostitutes. Ironically, Gay presents these as the more trustworthy characters with their own moral code, in contrast to the corruption of the Prime Minister Sir Robert Walpole and London's elite society.

The plot of the play focuses on the exploits of the highwayman Macheath. At the heart of the action is the love triangle between him. Polly Peacham and Lucy Lockit. When Pollu's father, who happens to be Macheath's fence, discovers that his daughter is married to the highwayman, he is furious and can only reconcile his anger with the thought of reporting him to the authorities and gaining a reward. Polly alerts her husband to the danger but he is later betrayed by prostitutes he meets in a local tavern. He is arrested and taken to Newgate Prison where the gaoler is Mr Lockit. Lucy, who is pregnant with Macheath's child, confronts her lover about his marriage to Polly. He vehemently denies any wrongdoing, claiming the events are a figment of Polly's imagination. Consequently, Lucy steals the keys and secures his release, only for him to be recaptured and sentenced to a public hanging. The Beggar, representing the playwright, halts the action and facilitates a reprieve for Macheath, blaming the popular expectation of a happy ending.

Gav uses his text to criticise the corruption that was rife in the 18th century, using Peacham and Lockit in particular to symbolise the amoral people who held positions of power. Macheath initially perpetuates the common romantic perception of outlaws and uses his personality to manipulate the women he encounters. However, the play suggests that he is a flawed man, which in turn directs the audience to see past the image and to look at the man behind it. Ayckbourn cleverly uses songs and dialogue from The Beggar's Opera to comment on the 'activities' of the members of PALOS.


Friends of the Mitre Players Claire Ali (Enid Washbrook)

Directing **A Chorus of Disapproval** has been a joy because the cast have worked so hard, been constantly enthusiastic and made her laugh so much, despite the freezing conditions of the rehearsal hall. However this is his first incursion into the music department playing the rehearsal pianist Mr Ames in Ayckbourn's A Chorus of Disapproval. He promises not to play too many ad libs and to try to hit the right notes — and in the right order. He has

recently translated a powerful modern Spanish drama into English and is looking forward to The Mitre Players premiering this theatrical first next year.

Neil O'Gorman (Guy Jones)

Neil sings in this show and he would like it to be known that if you think he sounds awful it is because the character he is playing cannot sing. However, if you think he sounds great then it's all him. He would like to thank his wife Lucy for typing these programme notes.

David Price (Dafydd ap Llewellyn)

Last time she trod the boards, she was at school and played - a very youthful -Lady Bracknell in that Oscar Wilde thing that everyone does! Since then, she's confined her talents to directing - most recently, Kes here at Trinity where she teaches Drama and Religious Studies. However, she has gracefully deigned to act once more after being made an offer she couldn't refuse... something to do with rats I understand! Sam is getting married in the summer and she's been at great pains to point out that she's actually much nicer than her character, Linda, She'd like to dedicate her performance to spoilt brats everywhere.







Director's Notes

A Chorus of Disapproval is set in 'Middle England', in a small community that thrives on intrigue and gossip. PALOS the local amateur light operatic society is in rehearsal for The Beggar's Opera. Dafydd ap Llewellyn, the director, is the heart and soul of the society. His vision, to take the society to new heights with this difficult opera, is doomed almost from the start as one by one his leading men drop out. Luckily Guy Jones, a new member, is there to take on each new part, and save the show. However, all is not so happily resolved off stage and Guy unwittingly becomes involved in events that closely resemble the plot of the play PALOS are performing. Ayckbourn's clever dialogue and beautifully crafted set pieces ensure that you will be entertained throughout by this talented cast of Mitre Players.
