Director's Notes

In 2017 I went on a Mitre Theatre trip to the Other Palace to see Kelsey Grammer (of Frasier fame) in a production of a new musical which had previously run briefly on Broadway. It was written by John August and Andrew Lippa and was based on the 2003 Oscar nominated film **Big Fish** starring Albert Finney & Ewan McGregor. It had a beautiful score and a really strong story – based on the relationship between a father and son and focussing on the question of coming to terms with your own mortality and fatherhood in general. It was a production which provoked a roller coaster of emotions - laughter, imagination, hope, excitement and tears so when the opportunity to direct it arose I jumped at the chance. I was delighted to be joined by the extremely talented Jo Morrison as Choreographer and new (to us) MD Shaz Dudhia. They have both made my job so much easier - sharing their expertise and making sure all the musical numbers look and sound great.

The main plot is set in the present day but the story unravels in a series of flashbacks which take us right back to Edward Bloom's teenage years when he was in love with his high school sweetheart, Jenny Hill and shared adventures with his teenage mates, Don & Zacky Price. As observers, we never really know how true all these stories are or whether all the characters mentioned in them really existed – you can make your own minds up about that. One thing that becomes clear is that Edward and Sandra have lived a happy life bringing up Will, their only

son. Now Edward faces his own mortality and struggles to connect with his grown up son, who himself is contemplating fatherhood with the impending arrival of his own child.

One of the criticisms I have heard about the show in general, is that the plot can be confusing because of all the flashbacks. Asking an actor to play a character who we first meet in his teens and ages right up to 60 plus, is a challenge for anyone so we decided to tackle it in the same way the original film did. We are using two different actors to play "Story Edward and Story Sandra" when they first meet, which is not how it is written, but I hope this is a helpful way of illustrating the time line of the story - let me know afterwards what you think. There are also two actors playing Will – the son, one when he is a child and one as an adult.

A show on this scale demands a fantastic team behind the scenes and fortunately the Mitres have all sorts of talented and clever people, too numerous to mention by name, to design, sew, light, build, find and make everything that you see on stage tonight. My thanks and admiration to them for all their hard work, patience, skill, expertise, advice and many hours they have put in to make the show come to life. We couldn't do it without you!

John August (Book)

An American screenwriter, director, producer and novelist, John August has had a string of hits on the silver screen, including *Charlie's Angels, Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* and this year's live-action adaptation of Disney's *Aladdin*. In 1998, August acquired the film rights to Daniel Wallace's novel *Big Fish* after reading it as a not-yet-published manuscript. This adaptation made it to the screen in 2003 directed by Tim Burton, and earned him a BAFTA Award nomination for Best Adapted Screenplay.



Andrew Lippa (Music and Lyrics)

Born in Leeds, Andrew Lippa emigrated to the United States in 1967 where he began working as a high school music teacher. His first musical, *john & jen*, ran for 6 months off Broadway and was the first of a string of successes for the composer, writer and arranger. He wrote the book, music and lyrics for *The Wild Party* and provided three new songs to the Broadway version of *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown*. Lippa went on to gain his first Tony nomination for *The Addams Family* which broke attendance records in Chicago during its initial run, and played over 750 performances on Broadway.



Julia Ascott (Director)

Having been a Mitre Player for over 40 years Julia has directed and appeared in many of our previous shows, most recently appearing as Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in *Single Spies* this time last year. She has directed several Minack productions for us with the most recent being *The Clockmaker's Daughter*. She really enjoys directing a new musical as the cast and audience don't have preconceived ideas of how it should be done, providing more opportunity to be creative. As *Big Fish* was only written in 2014 it is not yet widely performed by amateurs so we have attracted an extremely strong cast who have worked hard to put this show on in just over six weeks. Her next project will be co-directing the very challenging play *Coram Boy* with her brother-inlaw Chris Chambers (Head of Drama Productions at Trinity). As this will be a joint production with Trinity School there will no doubt be another new set of challenges. On Saturdays she directs for Glow Youth Theatre Group – along with several other Mitres and in her spare time she works as an Administrator in one of the Whitgift Foundation care homes, Wilhelmina House.

Jo Morrison (Choreographer)

From stomping to waltzing to dancing trees, *Big Fish* has had Jo prancing round her kitchen to create all manner of things and has certainly had her neighbours questioning her sanity! Injuries sustained from this journey round Alabama have included the 'fish slapping bruised thigh', the 'Alabama busted knee', the 'over rotated Army shoulder' & the 'do-si-do vertigo!'. Thank goodness we had a doctor in the character line up! Jo has put this cast through pain and pleasure to produce the musical numbers but has loved every fishy minute!





Shaz Dudhia (Musical Director)

Self-taught keyboardist Shaz makes his way through life as a freelancer across a wide palate of vibes, lending his talents to original artists, tribute bands, corporate events, and musical theatre. He is thus a familiar face at various petrol stations throughout the country. Some of his recent MD credits include: *Annie Jr* (Martlets Hall), *Little Shop of Horrors* (Chequer Mead), *Hairspray* (Harlow Playhouse), *High School Musical* (Martlets Hall), *Rent* (Brambletye Theatre), *The Wizard of Oz* (Chelmsford Civic), *Footloose* (The Hawth), *Fiddler on the Roof* (Chequer Mead), *Spring Awakening* (The Spire) and various cabarets & pantomimes.

Christopher Backway (Young Edward)

Chris has been a member of the Mitres for as long as he can remember, from his debut as one of Davy Jones' scallywags in *Peter Pan*. He is extremely excited to be performing in such a fantastic show along with a brilliant cast. Not fazed by his Auntie being his future stage wife in the show, he has enjoyed every second of rehearsals and hopes you enjoy the show as much as he has performing in it!



Megan Brown (Young Sandra) Megan lives in constant fear that someone will realise that she is not, in fact, a performer but accidently wandered into the rehearsal room on her way to the toilet. Megan has, however, since begun a campaign to take over The Mitre Players from within by seeding her relatives throughout the cast and is now related to 76% of the people onstage tonight!

Nicky Chambers (Sandra)

Nicky is delighted to be back performing with The Mitre Players family. Funnily enough the 'fantasy sequences' in Big Fish remind her of the fantasy lands in Gulliver's Travels which was the last time she was directed by her sister. Julia Ascott AND Megan Brown played a younger version of herself in that too. Gulliver's Travels was co-written by her husband, Chris (Head of Drama Productions at Trinity School) and they still have dreams for it to be picked up by a **Big Fish!** Her Mitre absence is partially due to setting up their own theatre company, Another Way Theatre and recent performances include Shakespeare In Shorts in France and Hamlet at The Minack Theatre.





Kate Gauntlett (Mermaid, Teenage Jenny Hill)

Kate has been dancing since she was four years old and hasn't stopped since! This is her second show with the Mitres, after performing at the Minack last year, her new favourite place! This is Kate's first show where her father hasn't told her what to do on stage, but she still can't get away from her family as her mother is playing the older version of herself! Kate has enjoyed the hectic rehearsal period, and has loved becoming a mermaid, a tree and a cheerleader all in the same show!

Louise Gauntlett (Jenny Hill)

Louise is delighted to be appearing in *Big Fish* along with her younger daughter Kate, who is playing her younger self. Louise first joined the Mitre Players over 27 years ago and has many happy memories of performing in panto, touring shows including the stunning *Wizard of Oz* at The Minack Theatre and the more serious production of *Nicholas Nickleby* parts one and two! *Big Fish* has proved to be a very busy show but she hopes you enjoy it, and have your tissues ready at the end!

David Harries-Rees (Don Price)

Up until two years ago, David had always shied away from the stage due to his family having fingers in all the pies, including the American ones. David's liver, however, is not best pleased with his commitment to the stage as he has been marinating it ready to be served with a nice Chianti. He has recently been searching for love, but wasn't that keen to discover it was to be with his sister onstage tonight!

Tom Lilley (Zacky Price)

Tom is happy to be back in The Mitre Players performing in *Big Fish*. He first appeared onstage with the Mitre Players as Pepe le Peu and has been playing pungent parts ever since! He has also played a bed bug, a fox and a frog in one of the older Mitre Players' pantos. He appeared most recently as the Skunk in *Bugsy Malone* and has enjoyed playing his mental age for once in *Big Fish* and finding as many opportunities to scream as possible. During the day he enjoys making cakes, knitting and finding new people to call My G! He hopes you enjoy the show.





Simon Long (Will Bloom)

Simon has been performing and acting since the age of five and has loved being on stage for over 20 years. Simon has been with the Mitre Players for over eight years, and has done many shows with them, including Ira Levin's *Deathtrap* in which he played the sinister Clifford Anderson, a role he enjoyed with relish. Most recently Simon starred as the smooth and sexy Bugsy in *Bugsy Malone*, a role he enjoyed with splurge! Now playing Will Bloom in this production of *Big Fish*, Simon has found this story of a father and son inspiring and thought provoking. The character of Will has been a great privilege to play and Simon hopes you enjoy his performance. Simon would also like to dedicate this performance to his father Peter Long, who had always been a great inspiration, friend and will always be one of Simon's greatest heroes.



Mike Mackenzie (Edward Bloom)

A larger than life story teller is how Edward Bloom is described; well if we go by waist measurement Mike fits the larger part and after 40 odd years on stage also qualifies for the story teller part as well! He has thoroughly enjoyed being part of this complex yet emotional show and despite stupidly volunteering to do costumes (under the banner of Karamac Costumes) has had an exhausting but enjoyable time. Thank God for his partner Karen (the other half of Karamac) who did all the real work.







Laura Mackie (Witch)

Laura fell in love with *Big Fish* when she saw it in the West End in 2017, and as soon as The Mitre Players announced they were performing it she just knew she had to take part. There was one teeny problem - how was she going to balance rehearsals alongside getting married just two weeks earlier? If only there was a small cameo part that allowed her to waltz in, belt a massive number, learn a handful of lines and then spend the rest of the show popping up as various nonspeaking ensemble characters...Luckily, when she tentatively broached the subject of auditioning for the show to her future husband, he simply replied "Sure, in fact I was worried about telling you I've been booked to play in the band that week!" Looks like that honeymoon is going to be delayed after all...!

Eddie McConnell (Young Will Bloom)

Eddie's love of acting began two years ago aged nine, right here with The Mitre Players in *The Railway Children*. Since then he has joined a Drama Academy and taken part in two more productions. He is thrilled to be back with the Mitres and taking part in such a fun and challenging show. It has been an added bonus to have so many family members involved too! Toni Raye (Josephine Bloom)

Toni is a new Mitre Player, this being her first show with them. Toni has been performing since the age of four (that's a long time), with the likes of The National Theatre and various pantomimes "oh no she didn't - oh yes she did!" Toni has written and directed shows for her church and loves doing a bit of stand -up comedy too! Ha ha he he he!

Ziggi Szafranski (Karl)

Ziggi has been performing for over a quarter of a century now and feels like he's done almost every show known to mankind. He also has a penchant for exaggeration, much like Edward Bloom! His first Mitre role was as Sir Lancelot in *Monty Python's Spamalot* (Minack Theatre) and he has since appeared as Stine in *City of Angels* and Mr Perks in *The Railway Children* on home soil. Away from home he was in *Dick Barton* and *Curtains*, both at Dawlish. This summer he joined the *Bugsy Malone* cast on the Isle of Wight, playing 13 separate roles including Babyface and Cagey Joe! Colin Warnock (Amos Calloway) Colin is a Founder Member of The Mitre Players, and has performed on-stage or in the band for countless productions over the past 46 years. Yes, he has seen them come and go! Having retired from his day job last December, he is throwing himself back into the Mitre fray, if only to fill his long, lonely days... Dancing has never been his forte, though acting and singing have remained his passion. Will he remember his lines?
