



# SIGNIPICANT EWENTS OP "777

- 3 January: Roy Jenkins MP resigns as MP for Street. The conference ended with a joint Stetchford, Birmingham to take office as 1st British president of the EEC Commission.
- 6 January: The music publisher EMI has ended its contract with the Sex Pistols punk rock group because of their notorious behaviour in first of a chain of countrywide bonfires to public.
- 17 January: Cary Cilmore, the convicted murderer, was executed by firing squad in the the charts with the anti-royalist Cod Save Utah state prison in Salt Lake City. This was the first execution to have been carried out in the United States for almost 10 years.
- 3 February: The Covernment announced plans for referenda for Scotland and Wales under its devolution proposals.
- 3 February: Bells rang out and gun salutes were fired throughout Britain to herald the beginning of the Queen's Silver Jubilee year
- 11 March: Film director Roman Polanski was charged with raping a 13-year-old girl at the home of Holluwood star Jack Nicholson.
- 23 March: A last minute agreement is reached between the Covernment and the Liberal Party to work together in the pursuit of economic recovery.
- 2 April: Red Rum galloped into racing history by winning the Grand National for a record third time
- 8 April: The Foreign Secretary announced the Covernment was to hold an inquiry into allegations that major British oil companies had been breaking sanctions against Rhodesia.
- 7 May: The Prime Minister opened the 7nation summit meeting at 10 Downing

- declaration of seven pledges to prevent world economic disorder and create more jobs, especially for the young.
- 6 June: The Queen and Prince Philip lit the mark the start of celebrations.
- June: The Sex Pistols made number two in the Queen - during the height of the Queen's Silver Jubilee celebrations.
- 16 June: The Prime Minister announced that Britain would join the USA and Russia in talks on a comprehensive ban on nuclear bomb tiestis
- 1 Julu: Virgina Wade wins the Wimbledon Women's title. The last Briton to win a singles title.
- 11 July: The Cay News and its editor Denis Lemon were found guilty of blasphemous libel in the first case of its kind for more than 50 years. The case was brought as a private prosecution by, Mary Whitehouse. She objected to a poem and illustration published last uear about a homosexual centurion's love for Christ at the Crucifixion.
- **18 July: Tony Benn, Energy Secretary** announced to the Commons that the Central Electricity Cenerating Board should go ahead with the order for Drax B power station at a cost of £600 million.
- 19 July: The Churchill Theatre, Bromley was opened by HRH The Prince of Wales.
- 16 August: Elvis Presley, whose singing and style revolutionized popular music in the 1950s, died. Presley, 42, was discovered

- slumped in a bathroom at his mansion in Memphis, Tennessee on Tuesdau. He was rushed to the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Memphis but was pronounced dead on arrival.
- 12 September: The leader of the black consciousness movement in South Africa. Steve Biko, died in police custody.
- 16 September: Pop star Marc Bolan was killed in a car crash in south-west London. The 29-year-old former T-Rex singer was killed instantly when the car being driven by his girlfriend, Cloria Jones, left the road and hit a tree in Barnes.
- September: Margaret Thatcher MP, leader of the opposition, goes on an official visit of the USA accompanied by her husband, Nenis
- **15 November:** Princess Anne gave birth to a boy - the first royal baby to be born a commoner for more than 500 years.
- 22 November: The Covernment was defeated in the Commons on its Bill to establish a Scottish Assemblu and its proposal to stage the first elections for an Assembly on a proportional representation basis.
- 25 December: Charles "Charlie" Spencer Chaplin, the comic genius of silent films, died aged 88. The "King of film", knighted in 1975, died at 0400 at his Swiss manor at Corsier-sur-Veveu.
- 27 December: Thousands of people flocked to cinemas in the UK to watch the longawaited blockbuster, Star Wars - a movie which had already setting US box offices alight. Bracing the cold weather, young and old gueued from 700 CMT in London, to snatch up non-reserved tickets.

Just know I've done loads.


