

A NOTE FROM THE WRITERS

What makes a fairytale? We all have a rough idea of the genre, if we're lucky we've been listening to them since childhood but what defines the term we, as adults, are so familiar with?

The fairytale is one of the oldest forms of fiction. A subgenre of the 'folktale', they are created for campfires, for late nights and moonlight, for mystery, for the unknown. They are the evolutionary ancestors of modern day fiction, stretching back to a time when stories were spoken aloud, far before they found themselves caught in the bindings of books. The term itself, however, is much more recent and first came into common use during the 17th century after it was coined by the French Baroness: Madame d'Aulnoy, a prolific writer known for her contes de fees (fairy tales).

Since then, clarifying the genre has turned into a vigorous debate, with many scholars offering up their, usually contrasting, opinions. Some say a fairytale requires magic, others simply an air of the fantastical. Many people in modern times would jump straight to 'Disney' when looking for a definition and it is true they have done much to refine, or rather stylise, the form. Most would be able to call up a specific writer, or writers, to go alongside the term: Hans Christian Andersen or Wilhelm and Jacob Grimm. In fact, in modern literature the lines often blur with audience age, with a tale for children being termed a 'fairytale' and its adult counterpart turning into fantasy fiction, opening up a plethora of authors to choose from.

When we first began writing 'The Clockmaker's Daughter', the one thing we were certain of was that we wanted a new fairytale. We wanted all the trappings of the traditional form: the magic, the fantastical feel, the supernatural elements, the moral core and the simplicity that comes with the genre's narrative. But it had to be new; it had to be different – not least because obtaining the rights for anything that wasn't was driving us a little mad, but also because with it came freedom. Starting from nothing meant that nothing was set; it became fluid, natural and transformative (another fairytale definition by those argumentative scholars) and that was exciting.

We make no claim to know what makes a fairytale . . . 'The Clockmaker's Daughter' marks us doing the very best we can to try and define what a fairytale means to us.

We hope you like it . . .

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

I first saw The Clockmaker's Daughter last June when it premiered at the Landor Theatre, Clapham. This is a tiny venue above a pub and somehow they managed to create the town of Spindlewood with a cast of approximately 20 and band of 4 in this intimate space. It was a thoroughly enjoyable afternoon and the production went on to receive 5 star reviews, nominations for all sorts of awards and played to sell-out audiences. I loved the music and it is always interesting to hear and see an original story, and as it was billed as a Faerytale more or less anything could happen! So when asked if I would consider directing it for our Summer 2016 Minack production I jumped at the chance, despite having some reservations as I hadn't directed anything for 6 years. I met with the talented young writers Michael & Daniel, who were willing to let us tackle their show and give it the Mitre treatment. I very much hope they are pleased with the outcome.

The Mitre Players would not be doing an intimate production in a tiny theatre but would be producing a spectacular large scale show, with a bigger cast, enormous set, larger band, new design, costumes, props, special effects and all the usual razzmatazz that goes into the sort of full scale musical for which we have

become known. I needed help, so I turned to long-time friends Andy Rapps and Helen Harman. Andy and I had first worked together on a Mitre Pantomime in 1990 before he had established himself as a MD. consistently working in the West End on big musicals. Andy co-wrote Gulliver's Travels with my brother-inlaw, Chris Chambers, which premiered as our 2008 Minack production, which I directed, so together we were used to working on original shows. Helen has worked with me on several occasions (also Gulliver's Travels) and we are on the same wavelength, working in similar ways so it is always a very comfortable and supportive relationship. I'd like to thank Andy & Helen for all their hard work, expertise, dedication and continued friendship.

We have been rehearsing since the beginning of May and this has probably proved to be one of the most challenging shows I have directed as the music and harmony singing is very difficult and there is plenty for the ensemble to do. No one knew the music before we started and the cast have worked extremely hard to perfect it for your enjoyment tonight. I have particularly enjoyed rehearsing with Colin (Abraham), Megan (Constance), Helen (Ma Riley) and

Calum (Will) who have the lion's share of the dialogue and who have been happy to try things out, adapt, listen and grow during the rehearsal process all very talented actors & singers and they have made our rehearsals good fun for me. I have known Megan, Helen and Colin for many years, acted with them on many occasions, directed them and indeed been directed by both Colin & Helen. Calum is new to the Mitres but has fitted in easily and been a joy to have in the cast - I hope this will be the first of many Mitre shows for him. I'd also like to give a special mention to Laura Brand who was originally playing Moll but stepped up to play Amelia when our original actress had to drop out with 6 weeks to go and to Jo Morrison who then stepped in to play Moll. Thanks and well done girls!

A show like this demands a fantastic team behind the scenes and fortunately the Mitres have all sorts of talented and clever people, too numerous to mention by name, to design, sew, light, build, find and make everything that you see on stage tonight. My thanks and admiration to them for all their hard work, patience, skill, expertise, advice and many hours they have put in to make the show come to life. We couldn't do it without you!

Finally, I would like to thank my family for their support, particularly my husband Marcus who has put up with me being tired and busy for the last few months and encourages me every day – even though he can't stand Musical Theatre!



THE WRITERS

Michael Webborn has worked around the UK as a Musical Director, Accompanist and Arranger. The Clockmaker's Daughter marks the completion of Michael's first full length musical composition. After writing a series of conceptual songs for a possible musical adaptation of The Night Circus by Erin Morgenstern with writing partner Daniel Finn, they set out on writing a wholly original project. He is in the process of writing several new musicals with Finn including Animus, a commission for the Musical Theatre Academy being performed at the Bridewell Theatre in September. He has also composed several songs for projects with Shakespeare 4 Kidz.

As Arranger/MD: Beauty and the Beast, A Midsummer Night's Dream, Aladdin, Macbeth, Pinocchio, The Tempest, The Little Mermaid (all International Tours) and Jack and the Beanstalk (Perth Theatre).

As Musical Director: The Clockmaker's Daughter (World Premiere, Landor Theatre), Aladdin (Harlequin Theatre, Redhill), Willy Wonka (DUCTAC Theatre, Dubai), Damn Yankees (Landor Theatre), Showstoppers (Harlington Centre, Fleet), Macbeth (International Tour), Meet Me in St. Louis (UK Premiere, Landor Theatre), Next Thing You Know (Landor Theatre), Spring Awakening (Catford Broadway, London), Hot Mikado (Landor Theatre), Curtains (European Premiere, Landor Theatre) and Elegies for Angels, Punks and Raging Queens (Tron Theatre, Glasgow).

As Assistant Musical Director: Blood Brothers (UK, No. 1 Tour) and I Love You Because (Jermyn Street Theatre).

As Musical Supervisor: Aladdin (Harlington Centre, Fleet), riZen (Original Concept Album and Workshops).

Michael returned to London after completing his MA in Musical Direction from the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland and holds a BMus (Hons) in Vocal Studies from Trinity College of Music, having also been awarded the Alan J Kirby Prize for Conducting and Charles Proctor Prize for Choral Conducting. He has been nominated for Best Musical Direction in Fringe or Regional Theatre for [title of show] and The Clockmaker's Daughter at the Landor Theatre by Broadway World.com. He is also Deputy Head of Musical Theatre at the MTA, London.

Daniel Finn has worked as a writer, actor, director and broadcaster. His first musical 'riZen' - written in partnership with Tom Oakley - was completed in 2010. Shortly afterwards, Daniel met Michael Webborn at a workshop for the project and while bringing Michael on board as Musical Supervisor, they also began to collaborate on a possible stage adaptation of 'The Night Circus' by Erin Morgenstern. Their second writing partnership saw them commence the original folk faerytale 'The Clockmaker's Daughter': marking the completion of Daniel's second full-length musical. He is also a songwriter for both 'The Kilderkins' and 'The Doll Mechanics'.

As a writer: 'Visillion', 'I', (as novels), 'Hidden in the Iyndaeg Tree' (collection of short stories). 'Why 13?' (anthology of poems). Daniel is currently seeking agent representation and publication.

As a director: 'riZen' (original concept album), 'The Night Circus' (demo recording session).






Jane Maisey as Mab

Karen Rapps as Lucille




