

Director's Notes

Since directing a production of Daisy Pulls It Off at school with my senior pupils, I have been keen to direct a production with adults playing the girls of Grangewood, as it was originally written. In 2004 I mentioned to the Mitre Players that I would like to direct Daisy and after five long years I am delighted that we are staging it, all slightly older but more experienced!

Written in the 80s, *Daisy Pulls It Off* is a pastiche of the Angela Brazil novels and as such probably falls

foul of the 'Politically Correct
Police'. For the style of the piece I
have taken the idea of a girl's comic
and the action, props and set reflect
this. My set designer, Alison
Bottiglia, has also used the colour
scheme of the illustrations in the
novels to give it a period feel.
We hope this tale of schoolgirl
skullduggery and the eventual
triumph of a true British heroine
will give you a spiffingly good
evening.

Denise Deegan was born in London in 1952, she failed her eleven plus and went to secondary modern school. She trained in Stage Management at East 15 Acting school, subsequently working for theatre companies' throughout the British Isles.

Plays she has performed include The Project (London Fringe theatre in 1971 and again in 1973): The one and only wonderous legends show (for Emma Theatre Company): Daisy Pulls It Off (at the Nuffield Theatre, Southampton and subsequently at the Globe Theatre in London for nearly three years, winning awards for S.W.E.T and drama monthly for 'comedy of the year'): a Trilogy of Pembrokeshire farming plays for the Torch Theatre, Milford Haven: A Late Late Christmas Carol for Derby Playhouse studio: The Midsummer

Gathering and an adaptation of Tom Jones for Harrogate Theatre: a co-adaptation of Swallows and Amazons for the Nuffield Theatre,
Southampton (directed by Marina Caldarone in a subsequent production at Theatr Clwyd): and No Birds Sing for the National Youth Theatre of Wales.

She has also run Theatre writing workshops at Theatr Clwyd and Harrogate Theatre.



THE SMITHY

"Under the spreading chestnut tree the village Smithy stands"

A smithy is usually a place where horses are shod but the Smithy of which I am going to tell you is put to a very different use. We take the place of horses and our galoshes, boots and slippers are ranged instead of horse -shoes, along a wooden shelf. Our shelves, which were kindly put up for us by Mr White, are filled with tools, not for hammering iron but for hammering knowledge into our wooden heads.

In the forge in place of a fire we keep our 'crosses and balls and all the many pieces of paper and rubbish that collect.

Horses do not usually have mackintoshes, galoshes and umbrellas, nor do they wear sou'westers, but if you go into this smithy on a week-day morning you will find a number of these useful things attached to the rings and hooks to which the horses should be tied.

There are steeds at times in the Smithy but not the sort you would expect, for they have wheels and mudguards and handlebars and instead of four feet they lean stiffly against the white washed-walls.

There is the fodder in the Smithy, which is kept in a tin box labelled "Family Mixed McFarlane and Lang". This is eagerly consumed by a number of hungry colts between 10.30 and 10.45. At 11.45 these colts troop in again to learn their paces and on these occasions dust is apt to rise from their well-shod feet.

There is general shoeing at 12.3 and when books, mackintoshes, galoshes and iron steeds have been collected, the door is locked, and except when there is exercising in the afternoon, the Smithy's left in peaceful solitude until the morrow morning.
