

Director's Notes

Deathtrap was written in 1978 and enjoyed a four-year run on Broadway when it first opened, receiving rave reviews. It successfully transferred to London where it ran from 1978 to 1981 and in 2010, the play was revived in the West End, starring Simon Russell Beale and Claire Skinner. Deathtrap is not only a thriller: it is also a meta -play which comments on and pays tribute to the murder mysteries of the time in which it was written. The genre no longer dominates the stage as it once did, except perhaps in the am dram world: watching it is rather like watching a classic movie from the 1970s.

When it was first published, the preface described it as "something so evil that it infects all who touch it". In *Deathtrap*, Levin has taken the basic components of thrillers and horror stories - murder, deceit, innocent dialogue with hidden sinister meanings, plot reversals and unexpected turns of events - and repeatedly twisted and rearranged the pieces. It has been described as a postmodern thriller which wants to mislead us at every turn, confound all our expectations, and provide at least one moment when, according

to one critic, "we levitate from our seats and come down screaming".

In 1982, **Deathtrap** was adapted into a film of the same name, starring Michael Caine and Christopher Reeve and a romantic kiss between the two male leads was featured. In 2012, however, the author's estate denied the Los Angeles Gay and Lesbian Centre permission to revive its production of the play as they wanted to emphasise this aspect and, according to one film critic, "It is a gay relationship, but it's a tacit one".

A hugely popular stage and screen success, this ingeniously-constructed play offers a rare and skilful blending of two priceless theatrical ingredients - gasp-inducing thrills and spontaneous laughter. Unknown dramatist Clifford Anderson has sent his new thriller to award-winning Broadway author Sidney for comment. Without a success to his credit for some years, Sidney plots with his wife Myra about how best to plagiarise *Deathtrap* and when Clifford turns up to discuss the play, events take a sinister turn.
