

#### The Writing of "Dying for Dinner"

The most common question I am asked (other than why do the Metropolitan Police still employ you) is "When you're thinking of writing a new play where do you get your ideas from?". Well, about six years ago I saw a survey in Amateur Stage which showed that the most favoured genre of play by amateur audiences was comedy, swiftly followed by murder mysteries. Also high on the list were plays about amateur drama. I scanned the Samuel French play directory and could find nothing that matched all three criteria, saw my chance to fill a gap in the market and filed the idea away into the 'must get round to doing that one' file.

A couple of years ago on a trip to Australia, I came across a 'Murder Mystery' dinner party game. I bought it and on my return to England, I set about organising two dinner parties at my home. I set up video cameras and filmed the process to see how it all worked and voila! The rest as they say is history. Needless to say the script has been over-dramatised and bears no relation to the goings on at either party, which as I recall ended up both times with everybody getting drunk and one of the players regurgitating his dinner down my newly plumbed kitchen sink. Having got the skeleton of the play written, I needed to find a play for the company to be in the process of performing and my research revealed that 'Table Manners' by Alan Ayckbourn was the most performed amateur play for the second year running, so it seemed a suitable choice, not least because Mr Ayckbourn is a particular writing guru of mine and I'll be the first to admit I have tried to lean heavily on his particular style for this piece although you'd never know it.

Having finished the first draft, I sent the script off to Mr Ayckbourn to obtain his blessing to refer to and use his characters in my play and I now have a marvellous signed letter of appreciation from the man himself which, with a bit of luck, my heirs will be able to sell for a fortune one day.

Unlike many writers, I am fortunate to be a member of a theatre group who are brave enough to take on a new work and showcase it, and the opportunity to workshop a new piece in rehearsals with the actors to find its strengths and weaknesses prior to its presentation, gives me the opportunity of fine-tuning it before you, the audience, get to see it. I hope we've got it about right but you'll be the judge of that, and I'm sure that once I've seen it performed before a live audience, I will be making a few more changes before I send it off for publication.


## The Players

Occupation: (nearly) Chartered Accountant


Hobbies: Curry and Beer
