

# FROM THE WRITERS

Andy and I first discussed writing a musical together in August 2006. We were looking for a powerful story that had strong dramatic potential. A copy of Gulliver's Travels came to light in my bookcase. This particular edition was illustrated by Arthur Rackham and it fell open on a wonderfully visual plate of Gulliver being attacked by wasps. There were possibilities here. It would clearly be exciting to stage such scenes, but was there a story? Andy and I read the book in detail and over the next year discussed possible approaches to staging it. We found the travels to be colourful and varied, but quite episodic. There was no shortage of material to adapt, but we ran the risk of presenting quirky scene after scene without a narrative drive. And though satire was strong, Gulliver's emotional life was deeply hidden. Hardly dramatic.

But help was at hand. At the very point in the book where Gulliver loses faith in Mankind, Swift presents the reader with a man who is compassionate and humane, rehabilitating Gulliver and returning him to his family. It was this character, Don Pedro de Mendez, that seemed to unlock the essence of the piece for us. It gave Gulliver a friend and confidant - someone to recount and relive his travels with; to help him see things from a different and perhaps wiser perspective and, having sunk low, find a better way to be. There is a balance that Don Pedro brings to the story; a balance that Gulliver must achieve. And these thoughts eventually led us to the opening number -Another Way.

We also wanted Gulliver's relationship with his long-suffering wife, Mary and family to inform his travels and glue the different sections of the story together. Hardly mentioned in the book, Mary's perspective on events becomes integral to our piece.

Lilliput and Brobdingnag are the best known parts of Gulliver's Travels and have entertained for centuries. But it is in the third (and most long winded) part of the book that Swift moves into some illuminating areas. A race called The Struldbruggs that can never die; a man who calls up the Spirits of the past and talks with them. Rather than present these as individual scenes we chose to maintain a solid structure and take the essence from them instead, inventing the character of Gaia - a young women with a passionate heart, fighting for freedom and equality. We place her in the midst of the conflict between Laputa and Lindalino and present a version of what might well have occurred. It is the effect of Gulliver's relationship with Gaia that leads him to seek escape from humanity and take refuge for a time in the land of the horses.

Houyhnhnmland is the most profound section of Gulliver's Journey and leads him to a catharsis that nearly destroys him. But the message from Don Pedro is clear -

"Journey On – Upon the ocean wave Every day a thousand reasons You must take the journey on So much for you to give Free your mind The purpose of the journey you will find And live..."

Andy and I spent a year developing ideas before a single word was written. By the time we came to write the book, music and lyrics we were approaching the project from the same angle. Inevitably there was some cross-over in the division of labour. The majority of the music is Andy's and the majority of the book and lyrics are mine – but ours is a collaborative effort and we have both found nice ways of telling each other when things are not quite working!

We would like to thank The Mitre Players for choosing our musical to take to The Minack and we are both very grateful for the friendliness, enthusiasm and commitment of the wonderful cast, crew and production team led by Julia Ascott.

My wife, Nicky gave birth to Rosie during the writing of this piece. Soon after, the mid-wife visited to check all was well. From the living room, the sound of two grown men could be heard neighing repeatedly, like horses. As the midwife left she turned to Nicky and said, "Your daughter is fine, but I am concerned for your husband!" We all hope that this production will prove that the midwife had nothing to worry about.

Jonathan Swift (1667 - 1745), born in Dublin was an Anglo-Irish satirist, essayist, political pamphleteer (first for Whigs then for the Tories), poet and cleric. After his university studies in Ireland, the political troubles forced him to travel to England. He spent most of his life travelling across the Irish Sea. Later in life he became Dean of St. Patrick's, Dublin. He is remembered for works like Gulliver's Travels, A Modest Proposal, A Journal to Stella, Drapier's Letters, The Battle of the Books, An Argument Against Abolishing Christianity and A Tale of a Tub.

Gulliver's Travels, first published in 1726, is Swift's masterpiece. As with his other writings, it was published under a pseudonym, the fictional Lemuel Gulliver, a ship's surgeon and later a sea captain. Occasionally he also published items anonymously.

Though it has often been mistakenly thought of and published in simplified form, as a children's book, it is a great and sophisticated satire of human nature based on Swift's experience of his times. For instance, the episode when the giant Gulliver puts out the Lilliputian palace fire by urinating on it can be seen as a metaphor for the Tories' illegal Irish peace treaty; having done a good thing in an unfortunate manner. *Gulliver's Travels* is an anatomy of human nature, a sardonic looking-glass, often criticized for its

apparent misanthropy. It asks its readers to refute it, to deny that it has not adequately characterized human nature and society. Each of the four books recounting four voyages to mostly-fictional exotic lands - has a different theme, but all are attempts to deflate human pride. Critics hail the work as a satiric reflection on the failings of Enlightenment modernism.

John Ruskin, the nineteenth century author, poet and critic, named him as one of the three people in history who were the most influential for him.



# **DIRECTOR'S NOTES**

When I was asked last summer to direct this hours discussing what we thought would production, the first thing I did was to reread Swift's novel. The book is a heavy read - complex and challenging, full of Swift's views on the world, religion, philosophy, politics yet it was appealing because of its complexity - how could we make this work on stage? I was intrigued to read the first draft script and excited by the opportunity to be part of the creative team that was going to bring it to life. This was going to be a unique experience - the world premiere of a new musical adaptation of a classic piece of literature - an exciting adventure, too good to miss.

Chris and Andy knew the key was to make it a human story - we needed to care about the central characters and be prepared to believe the unbelievable as Gulliver travels to four fantastical lands. After several rewrites, the script and score were taking shape and promised to deliver a dramatic, powerful story. Having secured the key production personnel who were prepared to rise to the challenges this show was to present, both technically and visually, auditions were held in January. Performing at the Minack is always such a privilege and we faced some very difficult choices. Casting was complicated - we wanted to establish a truly ensemble feel, with most people playing multiple roles.

Rehearsals got underway at the beginning of May and we struggled with understanding ourselves and explaining to the cast about the lands and characters we needed them to create. The difficult, eight part harmony singing challenged even the most experienced singers but with Andy at the helm, the music was starting to sound fantastic. Helen and I got to work with the staging and movement and spent many

look right, trying things out, doubting our ability to make it work and then experimenting some more - how could Gulliver be huge in one land and then tiny in the next? Would the audience understand the split perspective? How would the academics on Laputa move and what should the horses be like - realistic or stylised? Chris and Andy were always on hand to point us in the right direction or convince us we weren't too far off the mark. However, it was all much more difficult than I had expected and I only hope we have been able to do justice to their excellent script and

This show also places huge demands on the backstage team and our designers, Paul & Wigs have been inspirational - we are so lucky to have such talented people within the society. The set, costumes, properties, special effects, lighting and sound teams have also all played a huge part in the success of the production. Producing a show that has never been staged before has been exhausting, but also rewarding and fulfilling and I hope will provide you, the audience, with an entertaining and thought provoking evening. It has been a real team effort with the cast and crew all working extremely hard - I'd like to extend my thanks to them all - everyone has played their part and we have all had a truly memorable time.

Finally, on a personal note I want to thank Helen for embarking on this adventure with me and my husband, Marcus and friend, Jane - I could not have contemplated directing this ambitious production without your love and support.

#### Iulia Ascott: Director


This is Julia's 6th visit to the Minack with the Mitres; previously she has played The Wicked Witch of the West in The Wizard of Oz (1992), Aldonza in Man of La Mancha (1994), the title role in The Country Wife (2000) and appeared as part of the ensemble in Just So (2006). In 2002 she directed the Minack Trophy winning production of Honk! and is delighted to have the opportunity to direct at the Minack again - this world premiere of a brand new musical. Other directing credits include Something's Afoot, A Slice of Saturday Night, The Elephant Man and numerous pantomimes.

Chris is new to The Mitre Players, but he did see their production of Songbook in 1987 and unbeknown to him, his wife-to-be was in the cast, along with many of the same team as in this production. He went on to study at Cambridge University and LAMDA. His first musical, Gunpowder Treason and Plot, was short-listed for The Vivian Ellis Award and subsequently produced in Cambridge. Other original material includes new musicals for children and compositions for professional productions of Peter Pan at the BAC and The London Nativity at The Scoop Amphitheatre in which he played Gabriel and was also Musical Director.

Gillian Bartle: Production Secretary

Gillian has been on journeys and played numerous roles with The Mitre Players since being a "Bright Young Thing" in the first Panto, Cinderella Charleston in 1974. She has stage managed over seventy productions, being involved with all our touring productions. Her highlight to date has been stage-managing The Mitre Players production of A Midsummer Night's Dream, the first performance at The Globe, Bankside in 1993. Gulliver's Travels has been one of the most exciting but taxing journeys, co-written by her son-in-law, directed by her daughter, with all her family involved, she has been kept on her toes assisting Julia and acting as chaperone to the children. She hopes you all enjoy travelling with Gulliver as much as the cast has during rehearsals.

Alan Bishop: Lighting Designer

Alan has lit all of the Mitre shows at the Minack, but is finding the travelling up and down the steps of the theatre increasingly tiring, so is very grateful for the backstage assistance over the period. Not content with his "real" job as a Colourist for TV and films, he now has two part time jobs in local schools - no wonder he has never been so tired!

Paul Bowles: Designer

Paul has been with The Mitre Players for nearly eight years. Having never set a course in amateur dramatics he has drifted between set design, scenic painter, acting and prop making along the way. This will be the second time he has been responsible make and organise the props for Gulliver's Travels, for set design on a touring show with Mitre Players. The last being The Hunting of the Snark. He has designed numerous other shows but enjoys the challenge of a show that sets sail to the Minack. After this show Paul plans to do some travelling himself. Bon Voyage!

Alan Collins: Stage Manager

Alan joined the Mitres for Quasimodo over 10 years ago and since then hasbeen responsible for converting the designers' grandiose schemes into practical, easy to manage pieces of set that fit into small vans and can be carried down the cliff-side. How successful he is for Gulliver's Travels can be judged by the number of bad backs and splinters seen on stage tonight!

Di Jones: Costume Co-ordinator and Ensemble Di is looking forward to her first Mitre "tour" at Trinity and The Minack, although she's been part of The Mitres since 1980. She last performed 10 years ago when she "toured" with Surrey Opera, playing Mrs Lovett in Sondheim's Sweeney Todd. She is delighted to be acting for the first time with her son Richard and her stage "husband" Paul, whom she first directed 24 years ago. Di is also happy to let her good friend Julia 'get her own back' by directing her for a change, and she's loved it all.

**Sue Marr:** Properties

Sue's first journey with the Mitre Players was to The Minack Theatre Cornwall in 1997, with their production of Quasimodo. She spent most of the week operating a smoke machine, whilst hidden under rostra in the pouring rain! Despite this stormy start, Sue has continued to work as props mistress on subsequent shows, her favourites to date being Merrily We Roll Along and Honk!. This year she enrolled three new ship mates to help her her husband Pete, step-daughter Amy and fellow crew member from The Barn Theatre, Tracy. 
## Cat Longhurst
