



Julia Ascott (Choregrapher) is not prepared to divulge her age so we must assume she is either very young or very old! She is a wife and mother and yet has still had time for many stage appearances such as Puck (A Midsummer Night's Dream), Aldonza (Man of La Mancha), Kitty (Where's Charley?), Eliza (Turnabout) and has been in the chorus for many musicals. Mishaps have included skirts falling off and herself falling over in curtain calls! Although she has choreographed and directed numerous musicals, pantomimes and plays, Julia would like it known that she has particularly enjoyed working with such a talented and enthusiastic bunch of guys and dolls!

James Beal (Arvide Abernathy)
This is James' first visit to the glamorous side of the footlights since his appearance as "Red T-Shirt Boy Four" in Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor **Dreamcoat** when he was eleven vears old. More usually he can be found behind a pianoforte. Past Mitre Players' shows include Merrily We Roll Along, Turnabout, Millennium Dame, Cindy-Ella and A Shaw Thing (when he was Musical Director). James has definitely caught the acting bug so assuming he can meet another suitably sympathetic auditioning panel, he intends to get back on the stage in the not too distant future..... Could this be Return to the Forbidden Planet??

Francesca Binefa (Miss Adelaide) attends St. Philomena's High School for Girls and enjoys Art, Drama and Music. She has taken part in many productions playing a variety of roles such as Janet in Pendle Hill, a singer in Little Shop of Horrors and a dancer in Bugsy Malone She remembers Bugsy Malone particularly as she slipped on foam and revealed her knickers to the entire audience. Tonight, along with the Hot Box Girls, she will be showing them deliberately!

Ian Brown (Director) says he is too old. (For what?) He is a past pupil of Trinity School and is now Principal of Helen O'Grady Drama Academy. Ian started his drama career at the age of 4 playing the Innkeeper in a nursery school production of the Nativity. Over the years he has advanced to playing more important roles such as Faith, an ugly sister in Cindy-Ella, Widow Twankey (The Millennium Dame), Jack (Where's Charley?), Captain Von Trapp (The Sound of Coarse Music) and Rupert the Bear. Ian has also directed The Boyfriend and The Biograph Girl for the Mitre Players.



Sue Carter (Assistant Director) is a thirty six year old Special Needs Teacher so her skills are particularly useful to the Mitre Players. Sue is no stranger to directing, having directed five musicals for 9-12 years olds (including our very own lovely Mark Pearse!) although she is usually to be found 'propping' up the cast backstage or plunging them into unplanned blackouts whilst operating the lighting board. Her leisure time (what's left of it) is spent going to the theatre, eating and watching Eastenders.

Clare Dempsey (Sarah Brown) This is Clare's second production with the Mitre Players (having previously played the title role of Cindy-Ella) although she has been performing since she was seven years old. Clare includes Irish Dancing amongst her hobbies and informs us that she once came second in the All-**England Championships of Irish** Dancing. She is also currently a pupil at St. Philomena's High School for Girls where her favourite subjects are Art and Music.



Jonathan Faint (Benny Southstreet) has recently left Trinity School to continue student life at Drama College, Jonathan joined The Mitre Players for **Turnabout** when he played Mr Burdekin. As Friedrich in The **Sound of Music** he was pleased to have caught the set when it fell down and remembers the embarrassment of his trousers falling down in front of 200 people whilst "performing" Karaoke. Jonathan divides his time playing Hockey, performing, singing and rehearsing (normally for several shows at once). His next appearance is in Oklahoma, the musical, not the American town!



Paul ('Backflip')Grace (Rusty Charlie) Paul joined the Mitre Players in December 1998 and since then he has partaken in numerous productions. Regular audiences may remember him for his spectacular backflip as Mack Sennett in The Biograph Girl and his bad ad libs in Cindy-Ella when the trio of girls failed to join the Princes on stage at the appropriate time. He will soon be seen playing the role of Seymour in The Barnstormers production of Little Shop of Horrors.

Keith O'Gorman (Musical Director) Keith, or 'weird' boy (as referred to by friends), has been a Mitre Player for over ten years. During that time he has done everything, from playing a 'Horny Viking' to being in the audience (his greatest challenge to date). He has worked on a number of junior musicals such as **Bugsy** Malone and Little Shop of **Horrors**. He's realised he is getting old as he hears himself moaning 'these kids today ...' Keith knows the entire script of the film 'Jaws' off by heart and auotes it on request, it is therefore no surprise that he has two pet Piranha fish!

Mark Pearse (Sky Masterson) was once a pupil at Langley Park Boys' School where he didn't like any subjects and didn't study drama. He is now a financial adviser. He has been involved both backstage and onstage for a number of years. Previous on stage appearances have been Bobby (Cindy-Ella), King Minos (Minotaur) and A Workman Emerald Crown). Like Paul, Mark has bad memories of having to improvise when the trio of girls failed to materialise on stage in Cindy-Ella although he does have happier memories of being directed by Sue Carter when he was a little boy!





James Smoker (Nicely-Nicely Johnson) is a sixteen year old pupil at Trinity School and his favourite subjects include English, Maths and Physics. Although this is his first production with the Mitre Players he has previously played the part of a U.F.O. (Blastoff) His states that his most embarrassing moment on stage was wearing laddered tights and a skin tight purple leotard. Hmmm! James would like it known that he is wearing padding in this show!

Nicholas Uglow (Nathan Detroit) is a current pupil at Trinity School and enjoys the reputation of being the Mitre Players' youngest eccentric (anybody else notice more than a passing resemblance to Colin Warnock in his younger days?). He says his previous stage roles are too numerous to mention - so we won't. Suffice to say that he was obvious in **Cindy-Ella** as the Prince who put his arms out too early in the finale. Please note that this multi-talented boy made the pillbox hats for 'Take Back Your Mink' and aspires to be a Theatrical Costumier when he grows up.
