

George Stiles (composer) & Anthony Drewe (lyricist) first met in 1980 when they were both students at Exeter University. They wrote their first show Tutankhamun just after graduating (George in Music, Anthony in Zoology). It was first performed at the Northcott Theatre, Exeter in 1984 and then remounted at the Imagination building, London in 1992.

In 1985 they wrote **Just So**, inspired by the Rudyard Kipling stories. It won the annual "Vivian Ellis" award for unpublished new British Musicals and as a result was later performed at the Watermill Theatre, Newbury and the Tricycle Theatre, London with the encouragement and financial support from Cameron Mackintosh. Steven Spielberg has optioned it for a feature length animation.



Honk! was commissioned by the Watermill Theatre in 1993 and in 1996 they were asked to write the score for a new version of Peter Pan, in collaboration with Willis Hall. Having been premiered in Copenhagen it went on to win the Best Song and the Orchestra's Award at the International Musical of the Year competition. In April 2001 it was performed as a concert with an all star cast and the BBC Concert

Orchestra at London's Royal Festival Hall. It was subsequently broadcast by the BBC on New Year's Eve 2001.



Independently, in 1996, George composed the music for The Three Musketeers with Paul Leigh and Peter Raby. He also, with Leigh and Claire Luckham, adapted Daniel Defoe's Moll Flanders into a musical, using The Beggar's Opera as a musical source. Other projects include the score for Sam Mendes production of Habeas Corpus and a version of Tom Jones.

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Anthony has also been busy writing and directing independently from George. In 1992 he wrote additional lyrics for the revival of The Card (music by Tony Hatch and Jackie Trent). He has also written lyrics for The Canterville Ghost (1987). He is in demand as a director, most notably for Snoopy (Watermill), Cowardy Custard (Royal Academy of Music) and various productions of Honk!

They have also written two revues and have contributed songs to a variety of theatre, TV and radio shows. They are founder members of the *Mercury Workshop*, a writer based organization, dedicated to nurturing new writing for the musical theatre. They are currently working on a new musical about Soho.

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Hans Christian Andersen was Denmark's most famous author. His fairy tales are among the most widely read works in world literature. His stories of makebelieve have enchanted young readers around the world for generations. Many of Andersen's fairy tales have serious moral lessons that are intended for adults.



Andersen was born in Odense on 2nd April 1805. He was the son of a poor shoemaker who died when Hans was 11 years old. After attending the city school for poor children, Andersen left Odense at the age of 14 to seek a career as an artist in Copenhagen. He nearly starved while trying to earn a living as an actor, singer, and dancer. In Copenhagen, he received help from Jonas Collin, who became his lifelong friend. Collin got him a royal scholarship, which permitted Andersen to continue his education from 1822 to 1828. Andersen published the first of his 156 fairy tales in 1835, and continued writing them until he died in 1875.

Andersen gave each tale its own style, but his stories can be roughly classified into several groups: imitations of folk tales; tales based on Andersen's life (including 'The Ugly Duckling', an almost autobiographical tale); tales that make fun of human faults and philosophical tales. Some of the tales use settings in Denmark, but others can take place anywhere.

The tales first appeared in a series of pamphlets and later were collected and published in books. The stories became popular in the early 1840's, and made Andersen famous. His acquaintances included royalty and such fellow artists as the composer Franz Liszt and the novelists Charles Dickens and Victor Hugo. Andersen travelled throughout Europe and wrote many lively books about his experiences. A Poet's Bazaar and *In Sweden* are probably his best travel books. He also wrote an autobiography called The Fairy Tale of My Life.



Andersen was a sensitive man who eagerly sought fame and success. He never married, although he fell in love with 3 women, including the Swedish singer Jenny Lind and the daughter of Jonas Collin. None of the women returned his love.

Almost 3 years ago I was bought tickets to go and see "Honk!" at the National Theatre in January 2000 as a Christmas present. The whole family went together - spanning 3 generations, the youngest being my then, 4 year old son, Nathan. We were sitting with some other friends (many in the cast or crew today) in the front 2 rows of the Olivier Theatre. We had no idea what to expect but still in festive spirit, we were all out to enjoy ourselves - but assumed it to be a show primarily for the children. We had an absolutely fabulous evening and were all bowled over by the humour, wit and emotion of this wonderful show, which very cleverly seemed to have something for everyone - appealing to not just the children in the party but indeed to all the adults, many of whom are often difficult to please, especially where musicals are concerned! We literally laughed and cried tears of joy and sadness as we were taken on an emotional roller coaster of a ride which will remain a very happy memory. Nathan was so entranced that as the show finished he leapt up onto the stage (very easy from the front row) in sheer delight and happiness.

None of us were surprised when it won Best New Musical in the Laurence Olivier awards later that year. Immediately it struck us all that it would make an absolutely ideal piece to be performed at the open air Minack Theatre in Cornwall. The Mitre Players are delighted to be the first company to present this musical at this most prestigious venue.



When I first read the script I was surprised at how little dialogue there was, although I remembered each character being drawn very clearly by the actors in the NT production. The score is absolutely vital in moving the story along and setting the right atmosphere, often without the audience even being aware of it. The lyrics are both poignant and witty and help the actors develop their characters but the music itself is very challenging. I was therefore delighted when Jonathan Butcher agreed to be MD - and thanks to his hard work, expertise and enormous sense of fun, not only have we had a fantastic time learning the music but I think the end result is better than I ever dared hope for. The excellent band, under the direction of Andy Trewhella, wonderfully

complements the singing. Both Jonathan and Andy have been a very real pleasure to work with and I know all the company would like to join me in expressing our gratitude to them.

I decided to do this show with a large cast, as there was so much interest at the auditions, although originally it was written for a minimum of 12 actors - all doubling up. As a director, much of my time has therefore been spent moving large numbers of people around the stage and in this task I have been supported by my assistant Gillian (my Mum), who is especially good at overseeing the not very glamorous but vital administrative jobs. Thanks Mum!



Having cast the show, I started to develop a keen interest in ducks, geese and poultry and it would appear many of the cast also did their own research at local parks and farms. Jill Wilson, the designer and I borrowed ornithology books from the library and had many discussions about the colour of a particular breed's legs or beaks and I hope you will agree that the end result is visually stunning.

As with any show, there are always many unsung heroes and although I cannot possibly mention them all by name I have been extremely lucky to be

surrounded by a very talented & happy crew, who have worked tirelessly behind the scenes, and in front of house. Many thanks to you all - we really couldn't do it without you. As always the staff at Trinity School and the Minack Theatre have also played their part.



For the last 3 months we have been rehearsing 3 evenings a week and I have had a tremendously fulfilling time and learnt so much. My extremely patient and supportive husband, Marcus, still just about recognises me but I couldn't have done it without his co-operation. Finally, I would like to thank the cast who have made my job hugely rewarding and have always given 100%. We have had enormous fun rehearsing this show (thank you Mr. Stiles & Mr. Drewe) and whether you are part of our audience in Croydon or Cornwall, thank you for coming and on behalf of all the team I hope you enjoy our performance today, as much as we do!

Anthony Drewe was asked to help write versions of two classic Andersen fairy tales, **The Red Shoes** and **Thumbelina** with Jule Styne, Alain Boublil and Claude-Michel Schonberg. Sadly, neither musical materialised, but it meant he had an anthology of Andersen's tales. Believing that in **The Ugly Duckling** there was a timeless tale that people of all ages and walks of life would be able to relate to, he set about turning it into a musical, turning to his long time collaborator, George Stiles for the music.

The show was first performed at the Watermill Theatre, Newbury on 11th December 1993. At that time it was called **The Ugly Ducking or The Aesthetically-Challenged Farmyard Fowl**.

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A revised version, now retitled **Honk!** opened at Alan Ayckbourn's Stephen Joseph Theatre, Scarborough on 28th November 1997. This production, at Britain's longest established 'theatre in the round', was directed by Julia McKenzie. This version was recorded and is now available on CD.

It had its London premiere at the Landor in Clapham before becoming the first original British musical to be staged at the Royal National Theatre. Their 1999 production, again directed by Julia McKenzie, won best new musical at the 2000 Laurence Oliver Awards - beating **The Lion King** amongst others. This production, with a different cast that included Norman Pace, Clive Rowe and Tracie Bennett, toured the U.K. in 2001.

Honk! is now performed all round the globe and there are plans to produce a feature film of the show.



ANDY used to teach at Trinity School where he fell in with a bad crowd, otherwise known as the Mitre Players. He is now Director of Music at Wellington School in Somerset. His past Minack involvement has been Wizard of Oz, Man of La Mancha (on timps!) and Quasimodo. He has played the keyboards for most of the Mitre touring shows in the last decade and has been MD of the Jack the Ripper, Cabaret and co-MD of Return to the Forbidden Planet.





RUSSELL has been performing since the age of 3 and is currently training at the Charles Cryer Theatre, specialising in Musical Theatre. He is a man of many talents having made numerous television appearances and featured in A Night of 1000 Stars at the Royal Albert Hall, in the presence of the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester. Russell founded the Hawkeye Theatre Company and has directed their acclaimed productions of Dreams of Anne Frank and And Then They Came For Me. He subsequently landed a 3 month engagement in Lithuania where he managed and directed a youth theatre-in-education project on human rights. So much for one so young!

MORVEN is a physiotherapist, a useful person to know! She has not appeared at the Minack before - unless you count being part of a human chain when we struck the set of Quasimodo. She didn't even get to see it as the last performance was rained off! Morven is well known in Croydon for playing principal roles with several societies. Notable performances have included Shirley Valentine (Shirley Valentine), Dolly (Hello Dolly) and Mme Dubonnet (The Boy Friend). Morven is half of a duo called Mirage (the other half is her husband, Ian). She has enjoyed 'ducking' and 'diving' for Honk!




COLIN WARNOCK


CLARE TIBBALDS

CLARE lists her occupations as PA, make-up artist and resting actor - although she's not resting tonight. She has been with the Mitre Players since early childhood (and that's a long time ago!) and played a variety of roles including Yum Yum (The Mikado), Beth (Merrily We Roll Along), Polly (The Boy Friend) and Sue (A Slice of Saturday Night). She has also performed for other societies in shows such as La Cage aux Folles and City of Angels and played Eliza (My Fair Lady) and Grace (Annie). Clare has performed at The Globe and claims to have been the first female to appear in a Trinity School production.

HELEN directed our first two Minack productions, Wizard of Oz and Man of La Mancha but this is her acting and singing debut on the Minack stage. She is no stranger to acting and singing (note we do not mention dancing) and has played major roles for many leading societies. Notable appearances have included Roy Hart (Chicago), Adelaide (Guys and Dolls), Eliza (My Fair Lady), Sally Bowles (Cabaret) and Rita (Educating Rita). She is also well known for directorial skills having worked with numerous local societies in Croydon. She says she is really only here as a mum and does not perform much these days.





IAN has been seen at the Minack in The Country Wife, King Lear and Twelfth Night. He has played many roles for the Mitre Players and Ian has cornered the market in playing upper class twits. He also has the uncanny ability to recall all the lyrics of any Mitre pantomime song (usually composed by Colin Warnock who cannot remember them himself).

KELLY is a secondary school teacher. Previous Minack appearances have been The Wizard of Oz, Man of La Mancha, Little Shop of Horrors (where she played Audrey). She recently played Sharon in A Slice of Saturday Night and Mary Pickford in The Biograph Girl.

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CHRIS is a landscape gardener. His first production at the Minack was Little

Shop of Horrors where he was the puppeteer for Audrey II so in effect this is his first noticeable appearance here. Having played a plant and now a turkey, Chris is hoping to play a

human being in his next Minack production!

ANN is a personal assistant to a London theatrical agent. She has performed in numerous productions, to name a few, Cabaret (Fraulein Schneider), The Boy Friend (Mme Dubonnet), Nicholas Nickleby (Mrs. Crummles), Sweeney Todd (Mrs. Lovett) and Follies (Solange). She has directed The Mikado and Aladdin. To the Mitre Players she is best known as the Queen Mother!

JULIA has taken her role in Honk! so seriously that she spent a week researching in the Dordogne - home of foie gras! For the Mitre Players she has played an assortment of villagers, bystanders and whores! For other societies she has been more selective playing roles such as Beatrice (Much Ado About Nothing).

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JOHN has taken part in all 4 Mitre productions at the Minack. He has been in over 20 pantomimes, 18 plays, 10 musicals, 10 one-act plays and revues – and still he comes back for more. He can also wiggle his ears and move his forehead up and down. Aren't we lucky to have him!

CLARE is studying for a HND in musical theatre. She has played the leads in the last two Mitre pantomimes as well as playing Sarah Brown (Guys and Dolls) and Miranda (Return to the Forbidden Planet), both in 2001. She has also performed for other societies. She loves Irish dancing and came ninth this year - in what contest we have no idea!

MARGARET has appeared in all four of the Mitre Minack productions. She been in too many other productions to list but she joined for Sir Merryman in 1983. Her most notable appearance was as Lady Brockhurst in The Boy Friend,

JAMES used to be found more commonly behind the pianoforte. However, he was persuaded to appear on the more glamorous side of the footlights in 2001 for our production of Guys and Dolls and it's now become difficult to keep him away. Since then he has appeared in Return to the Forbidden Planet, The Long and the Short and the Tall and now Honk! On the musical side he has been involved in Merrily We Roll Alona, Turnabout, Millennium Dame, Cindy- Ella, Aladdin and

PAUL is an Old Boy of Trinity School although he joined the Mitre Players in 1998 whilst he was still a pupil. He has been in many productions since then, A Slice of Saturday Night, Cindy-Ella, The Biograph Girl, Return to the Forbidden Planet to name but a few. He was last seen at the Minack playing the lead, Seymour, in Little Shop of Horrors.

MEGAN is the very talented daughter of Helen and is a fourteen year old pupil at Riddlesdown High School. This is her first appearance on the Minack stage although she has been coming here since she was a baby. She has appeared in various Mitre shows and was recently seen giving a brilliant performance as Miss Adelaide in her school's production of Guys and Dolls. Megan is hoping to continue performing and is hoping to go on to Stage School.

CATHERINE has been performing since the age of three and belongs to several drama societies. Her favourite shows include Little Shop of Horrors (at the Minack), The Boy Friend, Oliver and Oklahoma. Most recently she has appeared in Half a Sixpence where she was lucky enough to play the lead. Catherine has really enjoyed rehearsing for Honk! and we hope it shows in her performance.

CAROLYN cannot remember her theatrical appearances as there are so many of them. She was last seen at the Minack in The Wizard of Oz. She is better known as the long-suffering wife of the dyslexic Australian drummer playing in the bandstand as well as mother of two lively boys, one of whom is on stage tonight.

LIZ used to work in the publicity offices of Channel 4 and the BBC. However she gave up all that "entertainment" stuff to marry Neil and continue in "Real Theatre" with the Mitre Players. She is the mother of two young boys (none of whom are on stage tonight). Liz has been in many Mitre productions and despite playing some major and some chorus roles, feels most comfortable playing pantomime animals. This is her third appearance at the Minack.

JAMES is a 17 year old student of Trinity School. He joined the Mitre Players in 2001 and has been in almost every production since including playing the title role in Aladdin, Nicely Nicely (Guys and Dolls) and Clive (Dying for Dinner). He was most recently seen in Trinity School's production

of ${\bf Bugsy\ Malone}$ under the musical directorship of Colin Warnock.

PAUL joined the Mitre Players in January 2002 for our pantomime, Aladdin. He must have enjoyed it because he was back a two months later playing Private Evans (The Long and the Short and the Tall) and now here is again. Since being with us it has transpired that Paul is also a brilliant scenic artist. An added bonus!
