



The most important thing I learnt for your whole life through, Never look up to them - then they can't look down on you!






Director's Notes



Colin Warnock and I were looking for a small-cast musical for our first show together as a production team. We first met, Colin as MD & me acting, in 1976 and I am delighted that our friendship, love of good music and witty dialogue still continues and has brought us together for this exciting production.

Is There Life After High School? is a cross between a revue and a musical play. The cast, who are not given names, and are known only as women and men, play many characters from different high schools in America who share with the audience their memories of friends and events from their school life. These memories appear as monologues, short scenes and songs which are at times both funny and poignant. The task faced by





the cast has been to perform without constant changes of clothes, wigs, false beards and make up. By using their acting skills, their voices and movement and the odd prop or piece of costume, the cast of nine constantly change characters and we hope you will enjoy identifying them all. I should point out that the reunion in Act 2 is also an amalgam of several such gatherings.

As the audience we ask you to use your imagination as you follow their reminiscences; you may well identify with some of them! My job as director has been made much easier by having a strong and experienced group of players who are able not only to deliver witty dialogue but hold a tune, often alone, against four or five other strong singers. Rehearsals have been a pleasure and, as Colin's famous song says, "I love it, I love it all!"




