



Introduction





Lionel Bart was born in August 1930, and grew up in Stepney in London. He was born Lionel Begleiter, however he later changed his name after Saint Bartholomew. His musical talent was questioned early on in his life when he resisted the attempts of teachers to teach him violin, and interestingly he never learned to read or write musical notation. His song writing brought him fame before he turned his hand to writing musicals. with Lock Up Your Daughters being his first in 1959. Oliver! was written in 1960 and was a huge hit from its beginning. Unfortunately from 1965 his works began taking criticism and he slumped into a pattern of heavy drinking. He recovered from a twenty year bout of depression, although he never returned to song writing. Bart passed away on April 3rd in 1999.


The Workhouse

The Workhouse was a nineteenth century idea, which aimed to stop the lower classes from becoming a burden on society. The official reason cited was to "set on work all such persons married or unmarried, who have no means to maintain themselves and use no ordinary and daily trade of life to get their living by". They were seen as a refuge for unmarried and deserted mothers, orphans, illegitimate children and the aged.

In theory, it was a parish committee which was left in charge of governing each workhouse, however much of the work was left to "a beadle". Mr. Bumble, one of this evening's characters, is a traditional example of a careless and incompetent beadle.

Life in workhouses was very difficult; they were ridden with disease and illness. Much of this was caused by over-crowding, and led to many people trying anything to get out. The diet in a workhouse was also extremely poor, with the rations being less than those given to prisoners of the time.

Another problem with workhouses was the separation of families; husbands could be expected to be separated from wives for long periods of time, and brothers were usually separated from sisters. Even children rarely saw their parents again in the workhouse. To this day, the idea of a workhouse rings of desolation and anguish.

Ian Brown: Director

Never feeling unable to abandon his Trinity roots and having directed **Romeo** and **Juliet** as a joint Trinity/Mitre production in 2003, Ian was keen to repeat the experience but this time to tackle a musical. **Oliver!** has long been discussed as a Mitre vehicle and it was an obvious choice for a joint production, given the casting. It has been a hugely challenging experience, not least in terms of scheduling rehearsals - why are Teachers, Pupils and Mitre Players never available to rehearse at the same time? During production week, just for a rest, Ian will be presenting parent days with the 32 classes he runs around Croydon as principal of the local Helen O'Grady Drama Academy.

Di Jones: Director/Choreographer.

This is Di's third show for the Mitres in eighteen months as director/choreographer, although there wasn't much dancing in **Cyrano de Bergerac**! She has directed **Oliver**! before but as it was with an all girl cast she has found working with the Trinity boys to be rather a novelty! Di has enjoyed working with this talented bunch of boys, staff and Mitre Players and just won't know what to do with her Sundays, Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from now on!

Colin Warnock: Musical Director

Colin's first encounter with Trinity was as an 11-year-old pupil arriving at the brand new (indeed, un-finished) new building here at Shirley Park. Whilst at school, he was involved in many House, Junior and School plays, and on leaving some 7 years later he co-founded The Mitre Players. He played the title role in their first production, **Charley's Aunt** in 1973, and began the Mitres' annual pantomime tradition in 1974 as Director, Composer and Musical Director of **Cinderella Charleston**. In 1982, having never been in any orchestras or choirs whilst at Trinity, he became a professional musician and has worked for 23 years at the prestigious Laine Theatre Arts college for the performing arts in Epsom, where he helps train the stars of tomorrow! Previous Trinity collaborations as Musical Director include **Godspell, Barnum, Bugsy Malone** and **Turnabout!** Colin still performs onstage, playing Dame in last year's **Robinson Crusoe**, and he gave his "Gumboil" here in January.



Fraser Macdonald: Fagin

A lover of Dickens on stage, Fraser remembers with affection playing four parts (**including** Mr Mantalini) in the Mitres' mammoth production of **Nicholas Nickleby** some years ago. He is normally to be found playing pantomime, including Dame on four occasions, and is delighted to be part of such a great musical as **Oliver!**. If nothing else, the skills he has learned from playing Fagin could well provide a useful source of untaxed income to supplement his future retirement pension. In his spare time he runs the Spanish department at Trinity School.




Warwick Jones: Mr Brownlow

Matthew Stone: Artful Dodger (Thurs/Fri)


