

The cosmopolitan mix of residents gives the area a unique atmosphere which enhances its reputation as a centre for arts, media, fashion and music. Camden is now home to MTV studios, in the building erected for TV-AM, which has resulted in an increasing number of media and recording companies choosing the area as a business base.

The first craft workshops were established in canal side buildings in 1972 and a weekend market established soon after. The popularity grew and further markets opened. In 1990 the whole area was redeveloped and now the markets are opened seven days a week to meet the demand.

Today tourists and Londoners alike flock to no fewer than six markets at Camden, as well as the fashion shops, hairdressers, restaurants, bars and

musis venues such Dingwalls and the Electric Ballroom.

In 2008 a large fire broke out in the Camden Canal Market area on the north side of Chalk Farm Road. After crossing the railway line, the fire badly affected the rear of the Hawley Arms on Castlehaven Road. Singer Amy Winehouse had made her name at the Hawley Arms, and later mentioned the fire in her acceptance speech for *Record of the Year* at the 50th Annual Grammy Awards.

New residential development has seen canal side conversions of old industrial buildings and loft style flats attractive to young professionals and students wishing to take advantage of the local atmosphere and work, shop and play a stone's throw from their house.



Camden

Before 1791, the area north of Tottenham Court was completely rural supporting little more than 'fields of cows'. The Fleet River flowed through a landscape of scattered farms and two coaching inns, The Mother Red Cap (on the site of Worlds End) and the Southampton (now Edwards). The road was the main route to Hampstead and the North, frequented by highwaymen many of whom ended up in a gibbet erected near the location of today's Camden Town underground station.

In 1791, Charles Pratt, first Earl of Camden, granted leases for the erection of 1400 houses within the manor, thus providing the area with its now familiar name. Even then the 'rural lane, hedgeside roads and lovely fields made Camden Town the constant resort to those who sought its quietude and fresh air to reinvigorate their spirits'.

Building was not widespread until 1816 when the Regent's Canal was extended eastwards bringing with it coal wharves, merchants and industry. In his novel, *Dombey and Son*, Charles Dickens (a resident of Camden) described the 'frowzy fields, and cow-houses, and dunghills and dust-heaps'.

The canal was followed by the greater upheaval of the arrival of the railways with huge tranches of land given over to the London and Birmingham, and later Midland, Railways. The first line into Euston was completed in 1837. Stephenson's engine shed from this period was licensed as a theatre in 1967 and, now known as the Roundhouse, is still variously in use today as an entertainment venue with the Royal Shakespeare Company as its most recent resident. The influx of Irish

labourers working on the railways resulted in a population boom and development of housing which Nash described as 'mean'.

In 1850, Frances Buss, daughter of one of the illustrators for *The Pickwick Papers*, wrote "Of all the various suburbs of our vast metropolis, this district is perhaps more thickly inhabited by professional men than any other". The open spaces by this time had given way to mostly respectable housing and small industries. The latter included the manufacture of musical instruments, telescopes, scientific instruments and clothing.

The underground station opened in 1907 and marked the final integration of the once rural area into metropolitan London. Even then Camden Town was a centre for shopping, including Bowman's Department Store, and entertainment, with not one but two large music halls. The Camden Theatre, was renamed the Camden Palace in 1982 and is now a popular night club and music venue.

In the second half of the 20th century Camden became very much the place to be, a happening area and the thriving music scene, in pubs and clubs, has been the springboard for successful groups *Blur*, *Pulp* and *Oasis*, as well as *Madness*.

The railways were a bombing target in the Second World War and redevelopment during the post-war period saw Camden become a centre for Greek-Cypriot settlement and today the area south of Camden High Street boasts London's largest Bengali/Bangladeshi community.

Our House - A Musical Love Story

Our House is a touchingly romantic and emotionally charged musical. It is also surprisingly thought-provoking and poignant in places.

Joe Casey, who is celebrating his 16th birthday at the start of the show, takes Sarah (his new girlfriend) out on a date and shows off by breaking into a newly built block of flats, much against Sarah's protestations!

When the police arrive, Joe has to make a major decision about what choice to make, whether to run and live life as a criminal, or stay and face the music like an honest man. The

show splits into two parallel paths and we are shown where each choice takes him.

Joe's dead father (Dad) is the narrator, looking over Joe's shoulder and almost acting as his conscience throughout the musical. Dad went to prison for a petty crime before Joe was born and on his release he got involved in a fight which resulted in his death. He does not want his son to end up the same way so he is trying to guide Joe through his life choices.

Welcome to the House of Fun.

Charles Marriott (Mr Pressman) Hard on the heels of his masterful performances (bit parts!) in Catherine Howard, Charles plays the devious Mr Pressman in Our House. Apart from being the oldest member of this very energetic cast (there's no ageism in the Mitres!!) he has to sing a tiny bit!! No mean feat for a non-singer. It feels a bit like a Britain's Got Talent audition. Usually to be found directing for the Mitres (Timing and The Mitre Mincepie Extravaganza in 2010), he has enjoyed being directed for a change.

Tim began writing when he was eighteen and after studying at Cambridge for three years his first professional commissions were *Heartlands* for Chichester, directed by Sam Mendes, and *A Man of Letters* for the Stephen Joseph Theatre, Scarborough. Tim's subsequent work includes *Neville's Island* (1993) and *The End of the Food Chain* (1994) both for the Stephen Joseph Theatre.

The Nottingham Playhouse production of Neville's Island went on to the Apollo Theatre in London's West End where it was nominated for an Evening Standard award and four Olivier awards. Tim's association with Avckbourn's theatre developed over successive plays to the point where The Safari **Party** was directed by Ayckbourn himself and

transferred to the New Hampstead Theatre. At the same time, in Spring 2003, Tim's first musical, *Our House*, with music and lyrics by Madness, won the Olivier for Best New Musical.

Tim's first play for television was the BBC Film *Money for Nothing*. It was shot in New York and Tim's hometown Frodsham. His first series *Preston Front* ran for three series from 1994, winning

the Best Comedy Drama Award at the British Comedy Awards amongst many other awards.

Tim's first two feature films were released in 2003. Calendar Girls, starring Helen Mirren and Julie Walters went to number one in the UK, becoming the seventh most successful British film of all time. Blackball, starring Paul Kaye, Johnny Vegas and

> Vince Vaughn reached number three in the UK charts. The two films opened in the same week at cinemas either side of Leicester Square.

Tim's latest film script is *Confessions of a Shopaholic*, released in February 2009. The film, which is a romantic comedy, is an adaptation of Sophie Kinsella's novels and stars Isla Fisher.

His recent work for stage includes a UK tour in 2009 of A Sign of the Times, starring Stephen Tompkinson. Calendar Girls in London's West End was a huge success in 2009 and is currently touring the UK and the rest of the world - one of the largest ever tours for a play.

Tim lives in the North West of England with his wife Katy, and children Jack, Joe and Georgia.



release of their first single The Prince and between 1979 and 1986 the band notched up an astonishing 21 Top 20 hit singles, including It Must Be Love, Baggy Trousers, My Girl & Our House. Sell out arena tours followed, both in the UK and North America and with the release of the album *One Step Beyond*, Absolutely, Seven and then The Rise and Fall, Madness cemented their status as the outstanding British pop group of the '80s. At the height of their success, however, during the recording of their fifth album, Keep Moving in 1984, the band was rocked by the announcement from keyboardist Mike Barson that he was leaving to move abroad. The remaining six members staved together to record their critically acclaimed but commercially unsuccessful sixth album. Mad not Mad, before deciding to call it quits in 1986.

But then a strange thing happened in the '90s. Bands from *Supergrass* to *Blur* in the UK and *No Doubt* to *Green Day* in the US credited *Madness* as a major influence on their own music and despite *Madness*'s absence, their reputation grew. After much public demand, the band played two open-air gigs in Finsbury Park in 1992, to sell out crowds of 70,000. A live album entitled *Madstock* followed and suddenly the Nutty Boys were back.

The remainder of the '90s saw more sell out arena tours and Top 10 hits with singles including *Lovestruck* and their seventh studio album, *Wonderful*.

Madness were the Associate Producers of the musical Our House and as such, were heavily involved in bringing the show to the stage, including writing new songs for the project. The show opened at The Cambridge Theatre, London in October 2002 with Suggs playing the role of the central character's father. It won an Olivier Award for best new musical of 2003.

In 2008 the group showcased the majority of their new album *The* Liberty of Norton Folgate at London's Hackney Empire for 3 nights. The Hackney Empire performances were recorded and sold to fans as they left the show on USB wristbands. Madness played two dates in December 2008, at The O2 in London and in Manchester. They also announced that for their 30th anniversary in 2009, they would be staging a 5th Madstock festival in London's Victoria Park, 11 years after the last Madstock concert. Through late March and early April 2009 the band played a series of festival and separate headlining dates across Australia.

Madness toured the UK throughout November and December 2010 with their final show at London's Earl's Court, where they played a new song from their upcoming album.


