Welcome to Romeo and Juliet



The school has a marvellous tradition of producing excellent Shakespeare plays. My predecessor, David Parchot, created the best school production of Much Ado About Nothing I have seen. Since taking over as Head of Drama, some ten years ago, I have directed The Tempest, with a revolving stage and river, The Merchant of Venice, Hamlet (at the Greenwich Theatre) and of course Macbeth at the Globe Theatre. However I think this production of Romeo and Juliet has been the most exciting one to be involved in. We haven't worked with the Mitre Players since Turnabout, and so it was really nice to build that relationship and many thanks should go to the Mitre's Chairman, Andy Thompson, for helping to re-forge the link between school and Old Boy Association..

Of course none of what you see tonight would have been possible without the hard work and enthusiasm of Ian Brown, an old boy and principal of several Drama schools. He would be the first to admit that he approached Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, the one play everybody knows, with trepidation. In fact he once told me he didn't understand it! And yet his knowledge of the stage and enthusiasm for the text has motivated a cast and crew of some fifty or so people. Such has been the response to the production within the school that we have had to organise professional fencing lessons, and the crew have

learnt how to build a set using professional staging equipment. The set itself has grown from a Mazur sketch to a computer-generated design and plan care of the Design Department, and the Art Department have been researching the appearance of Verona in the 1500s via the internet.

In fact its safe to say that as a school we have never had such a good response to a play, with the Music, Art and Design Departments all helping to create the final production. The school's AVA technician and maintenance men helped with the rigging of the lights, and we even had the principal of *Shakespeare 4 kidz* lending a hand.

And what of the story of Romeo and Iuliet itself? What relevance does it have to today's so-called civilised society? Two families involved in a gruesome vendetta that tumbles over into the lives of all who come into contact with them. The young carrying on the bitter dispute without questioning why, until love causes them to pause and consider their actions. It is with Love's sacrifice that peace finally comes after many years of bloodshed. Perhaps this play should not only be studied by our GCSE groups, but by all the world's politicians and military leaders.

ROMEO AND JULIET - THE PLOT

In Verona the ancient feud between two families, the Capulets and Montagues, breaks out again and even the Prince is unable to pacify them.

Romeo, the son of Montague, and his friends Benvolio and Mercutio attend a masked ball in the Capulet household. There he sees Juliet and instantly falls in love with her.

While trying to lose his friends, Romeo finds himself at Juliet's balcony and overhears her declaring her love for him, which he returns. The next day, with the help of her nurse, and Romeo's confessor, Friar Lawrence, they are secretly married.

Romeo is challenged to a duel by Juliet's cousin, Tybalt. He refuses to fight but Mercutio takes his place and is killed. Romeo avenges his friend's death by killing Tybalt. The Prince banishes him from Verona and, after secretly spending his wedding night with Juliet, he flees to Mantua.

Juliet's father arranges for her to be married to Paris, a kinsman of the Prince. In desperation she seeks help from Friar Lawrence who gives her a sleeping potion that will make her appear dead. Romeo is to be reunited with her after she has been "buried". He writes to Romeo of the plan but the message miscarries. Romeo hears that Juliet is dead and buys poison, resolving to die by her side.

With Juliet's apparently dead body in his arms, Romeo takes the poison. A moment later Juliet awakens and seeing that Romeo is dead she too kills herself. Over the bodies of their two dead children, the Capulets and Montagues are reconciled.

The action takes place in Italy in the late sixteenth century.

Ian has enjoyed returning to his roots at Trinity for this production. The school has been part of his life since the day he was born - his father taught here for 37 years, he was a pupil himself, then briefly Chemistry Lab Technician and he has been a member of the Old Boys



since leaving in 1978. He can't believe how many of his former teachers are still here and keeps expecting to be told to tuck his shirt in as he walks along the corridors.

This production has been a challenging, yet rewarding experience and Ian is extremely grateful for the help and support of the other Mitre Players in the production, notably Julia Ascott for her creative input. He has been delighted with the enthusiasm of the schoolboys for the project and only wishes they were able to come to more rehearsals.

In his spare time, Ian runs the Croydon branch of the International Helen O'Grady Children's Drama Academy where around 500 pupils aged 5-17 attend one hour weekly classes to develop their self-confidence and communication skills through drama.

Lady Capulet JULIA ASCOTT



Juliet MEGAN HARRIES-REES


