

Sir John is such an exhausting part to play that Warwick has most of the second act off. This allows him to 'double up' with some very clever make up; guess who else he is playing and two tickets are yours for the Minack show! He says it is always a pleasure to be directed by his wife, which is just as well as he has had 30 years of it.

Robert Critchett (Robert Ferrars, Thomas)

This must be a record. After a ten-year gap, this is Robert's third Mitre production in a row. He must have been bitten by the bug. Having realised he had missed the auditions, he was nevertheless pleased to help out by filling various roles, including his namesake. Any other roles will be seriously considered!

Julia Gibbs (Fanny Dashwood)

Julia is delighted to be playing the rather loathsome Fanny Dashwood in hopefully a lovely costume or two. A far cry from standard issue chain mail as 'Sir Bob' in *Spamalot* and brothel owner Margie in *City of Angels*, Julia has often appeared 'married' to Ian Brown but in a contrast to *House and Garden's* Barry and Lindy, it is now Julia's turn to wear the trousers and boss her husband about! *Sense and Sensibility* has been super fun to rehearse and she hopes you enjoy watching tonight.



Helen Harries-Rees (Mrs Jennings)

Helen has been a Mitre Player on and off for many years both as a director and a performer. She has been lying low for some years in the world of Am-Dram but got back to it when she directed *City of Angels* in February this year. Helen is delighted to be in a production with her daughter Megan but does have some concerns in being cast as the oldest character at Barton Park... and wonders if someone is trying to tell her something! She is hoping that she hasn't lost the acting knack or the ability to remember lines.... after all she is a granny of two now.

Director's Notes

The challenge of writing the stage version of a novel is condensing the story into a play lasting approximately two and a half hours. Jessica Swale has achieved this with a delightful 'cinematic' adaptation of **Sense and Sensibility**, which tells Jane Austen's story with sensitivity and humour. My challenge

has been to mount a production that is episodic but with a continuous flow from location to location. I asked Chris Raper, our designer, to create a set that was multi-functional and easily accessible, so as not to interrupt the storyline. The cinematic treatment, masterminded by Charles Marriott, who has used his experience as a film director to light the scenes, moves the story on seamlessly.

The challenge for the cast has been not only to learn the lines, act and change costumes quickly, but to remember the fourteen locations in Act 1 and eleven in Act 2, and turn up in the right place at the right time whilst moving furniture and props. Simple.





Di Jones (Director)

Since directing *Calendar Girls*, Di has been busy working backstage and helping with costumes. Her greatest achievement last year was designing and making the transformation dress for The Lady of the Lake in *Spamalot*. She is delighted that so many Mitre Players wanted to join her to present this new version of *Sense and Sensibility*, which has been great fun despite the gruelling schedule. She also wishes to thank the hard working backstage team for their contribution to this production.



Paul Bowles (Edward Ferrars)

Excluding the character of Sir Not Appearing in This Show in the Mitre Players' production of *Spamalot*, this will be Paul's first appearance since the Mitre Players' production of *One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest*. We hope that the relationship to Jane Austen's Elinor concludes slightly better than Ken Kesey's Nurse Ratched. Coincidently, both characters played by Tamsin Reeve.

Ian Brown (John Dashwood, Mr Palmer)

In his long amateur drama career, Ian has had many wives, but has never been henpecked by two in the same play! He's been married to Julia Gibbs at least once before - in fact they still call each other by their last married names, Barry and Lindy, but this is the first time he's been married to Tonia Porter. He'll wait until the end of the run before deciding which one to keep ...





Megan Brown (Marianne Dashwood)

Megan is delighted to be back on stage after taking a couple of years out to get married and look after her two beautiful children, Barnaby and Millie. She was last seen playing a wise man in *Flint Street Nativity*, and she can't help but think that she is more suited to playing a seven year old child than a graceful, elegant young lady. Having been a Mitre since the age of eight weeks, she has had to play opposite a range of men onstage, and she couldn't help but giggle when she learned that in this story, she would end up marrying 'uncle' Neil O'Gorman. Megan's husband, Andrew is her understudy for this evening and probably knows all the lines better than most of the cast after several evenings of testing her. Megan may seem convincing as a true 'lady' onstage, but, if you're buying, it's still a pint of lager and a packet of crisps after the show!!

Julia Ascott (Mrs Dashwood)

Julia has been a Mitre for over 40 years and started in the children's chorus, aged 11. She progressed onto juve lead, wicked queens or witches, leading ladies and now finds herself playing character parts or old people! As one of three sisters herself, she has enjoyed watching her three daughters, Elinor, Marianne & Margaret develop. She remembers Megan (Marianne) being born and this is the second time she has played her Mum. Learning lines though has definitely got harder with age, so she is delighted to be directing again next year after a six year beak, when she will be at the helm of the Minack production *The Clockmaker's Daughter*.

Christopher Backway (Servant, Gossip, Ball Guest)

Christopher has been a member of The Mitre Players since he was very young. He is a 17 year old who is getting back to performing in many upcoming shows for the Mitre Players after some years absence. He was very intrigued by the play, Sense and Sensibility, and decided to be a part of it. He is very proud of his brother James who is currently playing the lead role in War Horse (National Theatre production) and hopes to follow the same road so that one day he can be in James' shoes.



Anastasia Basharine-Freshville (Margaret Dashwood)

Anastasia began singing and dancing at the age of three and later went on to write and perform her own songs. She now adds acting to her artistic portfolio, with her debut role as Margaret. Margaret hopes to become a naturalist when she grows up, which isn't too far removed from Anastasia's day job as a physicist.

Jane Austen

It is hard to believe that Jane Austen died only six years after her first novel was published. She first wrote *Elinor and Marianne* in 1795, which she later revised and retitled *Sense and Sensibility*. It wasn't accepted for publication, however, until 1810 and finally published in 1811. A second edition was published, alongside *Pride and Prejudice*, in 1813.

Jane first started writing short stories in 1787 continuing until she wrote her first novel, Lady Susan in 1794. She completed it in 1805 but it was rejected by a publisher. Following Sense and Sensibility and Pride and Prejudice Jane continued to write and publish Mansfield Park (1814) and Emma (1815) until her death in 1817. Northanger Abbey and Persuasion were published together posthumously in 1818 with a "Biographical Notice" written by her brother Henry, which, for the first time describes Jane as the author of all the novels.



Born in Steventon, Hampshire in 1775, she lived her entire life as part of a close-knit family located

on the lower fringes of the English landed gentry. She was educated primarily by her father and older brothers as well as through her own reading. The steadfast support of her family was critical to her development as a professional writer. Her plots, though fundamentally comic, highlight the dependence of women on marriage to secure social standing and economic security. Her works, though usually popular, were first published anonymously and brought her little personal fame and only a few positive reviews during her lifetime. But the publication in 1869 of her nephew's **A Memoir of Jane Austen** introduced her to a wider public, and by the 1940s she had become widely accepted in academia as a great English writer.
