
#### Julian Chenery (Book, Lyrics and Director)

Iulian, aka The Broker, has recently discovered that he has been a member of the Mitre Players since 1984, that's 24 years! Two thirds of the Mitres' existence! And three years longer than he's been married to his wife (The March Hare)! "Is it time for a divorce?" she asks. He has written (with The Bellman) and directed (without The Bellman) recent Mitre Christmas successes Beauty and the Beast, Peter Pan and Robinson Crusoe, helmed our hit Minack production of Just So and last appeared on stage as Merlin in Sir Merryman. He is a professional theatre producer, director, writer and actor (you'd think he'd know what he was doing, wouldn't you?) and is the creative force behind the internationally acclaimed Shakespeare 4 Kidz Theatre Company. His latest S4K show - a musical adaptation of Hamlet - was premiered in workshop form by the Junior Mitre Players in March 2007 and is currently on a full UK tour.






(Composer & Dame Dolly Dumpling) Colin, aka The Bellman, first attended Trinity School in 1965, when it was brand new. After leaving school, he co-founded The Mitre Players and is proud to be still heavily involved 35 years later. Since appearing here last year as an Ugly Sister, Colin has appeared in the Barnstormers' production of Putting It Together and Mitres' summer production, It's Only Make Believe. He has also been Musical Director for productions of The Scarlet Pimpernel, Just So, Bye Bye Birdie and 42nd Street - what a busy year! This is the 4th Mitre collaboration with Julian Chenery, having previously written music for Beauty and the Beast, Peter Pan and Robinson Crusoe. For 25 years, Colin has worked at Laine Theatre Arts in Epsom, helping to train the stars of tomorrow.








#### Peter Bramwell (Bill Can'twright)

It has been too long since Peter last performed with the Mitre Players and he hopes not to leave as long a gap before the next one. Disappointed, he screwed it up and chucked it in the bin. However, Lady Luck had clearly decided to pay him a little visit, as the audition panel consisted of Ray Charles, Stevie Wonder and David Blunkett. And so now you, the unwitting paying public, will be subjected to his ugly mug. But fear not! The Prince doesn't appear until Act Two. This is only Mark's second Mitre panto, despite being a Mitre member for 8 years.



#### Cathy Longhurst (Fairy 7)

Having not been in a Mitre show since Robinson Crusoe, Cathy has missed the buzz of The Mitre Players! Playing the Good Fairy gives her a great opportunity to cover herself in glitter and shiny stuff - perfect for the festive season! For the last couple of years Cathy has been treading the boards at the Barn Theatre, Oxted in Crazy for You, The Scarlet Pimpernel and Sweet Charity. #### Paul Longhurst (Muddles)



# THE ART OF PANTOMIME

For 35 years now we Mitre Players have bravely sacrificed our Christmas holidays to create our own unique style of pantomime. All of it home-written and every song an original gem – well almost! In the early days the shows were written by Mitre Player founders Martin Tyrrell and Colin Warnock and in recent years, a number of others have stepped forward to fill their formidable creative boots.

Rather than the commercial fare that is served up in most other theatres across the kingdom, the ingredients of each Mitre Christmas show have been a combination of traditional fairy tale, a fashionable theme of the day, a contemporary twist, a liberal dose of childish sixth-form humour and a smattering of intellect. We've even created our own traditions with 'big red curtains', signposts pointing to The Crown and a bloke in a dress proclaiming he is "this year's Mitre Players pantomime dame!" You could, I suppose, call it "posh panto".

Now there are a couple of new boys on the block in the shape of the Barbican and the

Old Vic, who in recent years have also discovered the fun that can be had by tweaking the pantomime formulae towards one's own eclectic audience. They too have discovered that the result can be either a bit hit and miss or a five-star smash.

This year we celebrate the success of reality TV audition shows that help to discover Marias, Josephs, Nancys and Olivers. Of course, in reality, these aren't casting exercises at all, but brilliant pieces of marketing using prime time Saturday night TV to tell millions people about a West End show, to create a buzz around the brand, and a huge demand for tickets. In fact, it's the first time that TV and theatre have successfully combined to work together to promote the theatre industry.

It won't be too long before "Xmas-Factor" or "Panto Idol" fills your small screen with wannabee Whittingtons, potential Peter Pans or even aspiring Auroras.

But then - remember where you saw it first.
