



This is his first, and hopefully not last, production with The Mitre Players, and he is looking forward to playing a character who's still a teenager so he can have one last shot at acting like a kid again.







#### Thom McGowan (Eddie)

Thom started acting at the age of ten in his first performance of *Bugsy Malone* for 3rd Beddington Theatre Group. He continued to act with this group for many years, with Timon in *The Lion King* being his favourite part. Thom has also performed in shows such as *The Producers* with the Lyric Players, *A Winter's Tale* with the Rough Mechanicals, 'Cookie' in *Return to the Forbidden Planet* with Wallington Operatic and Dramatic Society and even a baddie henchman and Cecco, the Italian pirate, for Carshalton Pantomime Company. Thom looks forward to his first show with The Mitre players as *Slice* is different from anything he has done before.

# Jo Morrison (Penny)

As a newbie to The Mitre Players, Jo is thrilled to be performing in one of her favourite musicals, having last been in it 12 years ago! Jo works as a director with The Baked Bean Theatre Company (providing performance based services for adults with learning disabilities) and is also Director of the South West London Gang Show. Her favourite roles have been as Nancy in *Oliver!*, Rafiki in *The Lion King* and as various witches with The Carshalton Pantomime Company. Jo is proud to have been a part of the *Les Misérables* film and has not ended up on the cutting room floor! She has a full two seconds of screen time and is willing to discuss the exact moment with anyone that is willing to listen!

#### Simon Long (Rick)

Simon has now been with the Mitre Players since 2010 when he played Thomas Culpepper in Catherine Howard. He has been in nearly all Mitre productions since and loves every minute. He has been beheaded, married, tied up, pelted with asteroids, thrown about and taken pictures of naked ladies...(very artistically, of course). The Mitres clearly think he has earned his stripes and have given him the wonderful task of playing Rick. Simon started acting at five years old when he joined the Helen O'Grady Drama Academy, enjoying it so much he stayed for 13 years and has now even become a teaching assistant there. He is very excited about this show and is looking forward to the tour to Dawlish.



### Charles Marriott (Eric)

One thing you can say about Charles is that he brings first-hand knowledge of the 60s scene to this production! As the 'senior' member of this youthful cast, he has occasionally watched them glaze over when he has tried to explain that some of the situations depicted in 'Slice' really did happen! He was last seen in the Mitre production of Calendar Girls as Liam, the TV commercials director. This was more akin to his 'day' job as a freelance film and television director. Although he hasn't been on the tour to Dawlish since 2007, he is looking forward to showing the rest of the cast (the majority of whom have never been before!) the local cream tea establishments and the pubs.....or maybe both!

# Some Stars of the 60s

The Dave Clark Five were an British group whose single Glad All Over knocked The Beatles' I Want to Hold Your Hand off the top of the UK singles charts in January 1964. This was followed by Bits and Pieces in March 1964, Can't You See That She's Mine? in June 1964, Catch Us If You Can in August 1965 and Everybody Knows in 1967. For some time the Dave Clark Five were more popular in the US than in their native UK, but had a renaissance in the UK between 1967 and 1970. The DC5 disbanded in 1970, having placed three singles on the UK chart that year, two of which, Good Old Rock' n' Roll and Everybody Get Together reached the Top Ten.

Sir Cliff Richard, Kt., OBE (born Harry Rodger Webb, 14 October 1940) is a British pop singer, musician, performer and actor. He is the third-top-selling singles artist in the United Kingdom's history, with total sales of over 21 million in the UK. With his backing group the Shadows, Richard, originally positioned as a rebellious rock and roll singer in the style of Little Richard and Elvis Presley, dominated the British popular music scene in the pre-Beatles period of the late 1950s and early 1960s. His 1958 hit single *Move It* is often described as Britain's first authentic rock and roll song, and John Lennon once claimed that "before Cliff and the Shadows, there had been nothing worth listening to in British music."

The Shadows were created in 1958 out of Cliff Richard's urgent need for a set of permanent backing musicians, after the success of his *Move It* single. In 1960, the band released *Apache* an instrumental, which topped the charts for five weeks. In 1979 they recorded their version of *Cavatina* which became another hit single and in the 1990s all albums were reissued as Compact Discs by EMI and Polydor. In December 2004 The Shadows were each awarded the Order of the British Empire (OBE) but Hank Marvin declined his.

Sandie Shaw (born 26 February 1947) was British pop singer, who was one of the most successful British female singers of the 1960s. In 1967 she was the first British act to win the Eurovision Song Contest with Puppet on a String. Sandie was seen as epitomising the "swinging Sixties", and her trademark barefoot performances endeared her to the public at large. There's Always Something There to Remind Me rose quickly to No.1 in the UK Singles Chart in the autumn of 1964 and I'd Be Far Better Off Without You was issued as the follow-up, but DJs preferred its B-side, Girl Don't Come and the sides were switched. It reached No.3 in the UK and became her biggest US hit, reaching No.42. It was followed by further hits in the UK including I'll Stop at Nothing, Long Live Love (her second UK No.1 in 1965) and Message Understood. She announced her retirement from music in April 2013.

The Rolling Stones are a rock band formed in London in 1962. Their early mission was to share an enthusiasm for rhythm and blues, but they were received as symbols and leaders of rebellious youth. The first settled line-up had Brian Jones on guitar and harmonica, Ian Stewart on piano, Mick Jagger on lead vocals and harmonica, Keith Richards on guitar and backing vocals, Bill Wyman on bass and Charlie Watts on drums. Jones' increasing physical and mental troubles forced his departure from the band two weeks prior to his death by drowning in 1969. Since Wyman left in 1993, the full band members have been Jagger, Richards, Watts and guitarist Ronnie Wood who joined in 1975 replacing Jones' successor Mick Taylor. Their first international No. 1 hit was I Can't Get No Satisfaction, recorded in May 1965. The Rolling Stones celebrated their 50th anniversary in the summer of 2012, and released a large hardback book, entitled 50, in commemoration of the event.

The Kinks were a British rock band formed by brothers Ray and Dave Davies in 1964. Categorised in the United States as a British Invasion band, the Kinks are recognised as one of the most important and influential rock groups of the era. Their music was influenced by a wide range of genres, including rhythm and blues, British music hall, folk and country. Ray (lead vocals, rhythm guitar) and Dave (lead guitar, vocals) remained members throughout the group's 32-year run. The Kinks first came to prominence in 1964 with their third single, You Really Got Me, written by Ray Davies. It became an international hit, topping the charts in the UK and reaching the Top 10 in the United States. Albums such as Face to Face, Something Else, The Kinks Are the Village Green Preservation Society, Arthur, Lola Versus Powerman and the Moneygoround and Muswell Hillbillies, along with their accompanying singles, are considered among the most influential recordings of the period.

The Searchers were a British beat group, which emerged as part of the 1960s Merseybeat scene along with the Beatles, the Hollies, the Fourmost, the Merseybeats, the Swinging Blue Jeans, and Gerry and the Pacemakers. The band's hits include a remake of the Drifters' 1961 hit, Sweets for My Sweet, remakes of Jackie DeShannon's Needles and Pins and When You Walk In The Room; an original song written for them, Sugar and Spice, the Orlons' Don't Throw Your Love Away, and a cover of the Clovers' Love Potion No. 9. As musical styles evolved, the Searchers could not keep up and as a result, the hits ran out. While they continued to record for Liberty Records and RCA Records, they ended up on the British "Chicken in a Basket" circuit, although they did score a minor US hit in 1971 with Desdemona. In December 1985 Mike Pender left the group after a farewell performance in London to form a new band, and now tours as Mike Pender's Searchers.

#### Alex Greenslade (Barman)

Alex is the only Old Boy of Trinity School in the cast. He joined the Mitres just after leaving the alma mater and has been in many shows since. Now running a couple of businesses, he prefers only to do one show per year, so this time was delighted to take it easy and play this cameo role that involved learning no lines, dance moves or songs, as well as being the production manager. As if that wasn't enough, he recently added the chairmanship of The Mitre Players to his responsibilities! He is far from a 'Dawlish virgin', having managed to be in the cast of six out of the ten previous touring shows (the other four involved too much dancing!).



# Alex Greenwood (Production Assistant)

While neither singer nor dancer, or having any memories of the 60s, Alex was pleased to be asked to be involved with *Slice*. Having previously directed shows in his home county of Yorkshire, he looked forward to his first show with The Mitre Players. Please do not confuse him with the Chairman!

### Megan Harries-Rees (Sharon, Dawlish)

Megan has been a member of The Mitre Players her entire life, appearing in many of their productions. She was last seen on the Dawlish stage 15 years ago and is delighted to return for this production. Most recent roles for Megan include: the title role in Catherine Howard, Gaia (Gulliver's Travels) and the Kangaroo (Just So), to name but a few. Fiancé Andrew and eight-month-old son Barnaby are a great support to Megan, and although she can't remember the last time she went to a nightclub on a Saturday night, she wouldn't change the nappy changing and sleepless nights for anything!

# Meet the Cast

# Melissa Cox (Sharon, Croydon)

Melissa has been part of the am dram world for many years, playing roles such as Fantine and Madame Thenardier in Les Misérables (Schools Edition), Lucy in Jekyll and Hyde, Sue in A Slice of Saturday Night, Gertrude McFuzz in Seussical, Cinderella in Into the Woods and many more. Melissa graduated from the London School of Musical Theatre in July 2011. Since graduating she took part in her first feature film, The Arbiter, playing Pippa, and also appeared in Edinburgh Festival last year.



### Cat Curtis (Bridget)

Cat has found it fairly easy to get into the mind-set of a 17-year-old; as a secondary school English teacher, she has had ample opportunity to observe hormonal teenage angst in action. This is Cat's third show with The Mitre Players. She previously played the eponymous narcoleptic in the pantomime Sleeping Beauty and the whiny Ismael in Moby Dick!

The Musical. With CODA, Cat has played Ado Annie in Oklahoma - 'The girl who can't say no' - a rather different part from 'Frigid' Bridget, who seems to say nothing but 'No!' in A Slice of Saturday Night.

Billy J Kramer & The Dakotas. Billy grew up in Bootle and, on leaving school, took up an engineering apprenticeship with British Railways. In his spare time he played rhythm guitar in a group he had formed himself, before switching to become a vocalist. The performing name Kramer was chosen at random from a telephone directory. It was John Lennon's suggestion that the "J" be added to the name to further distinguish him by adding a 'tougher edge'. Kramer soon came to the attention of Brian Epstein, ever on the look-out for new talent to add to his expanding roster of local artists. Kramer turned professional but his then backing group, the Coasters, were less keen, so Epstein sought out the services of a Manchester-based group, the Dakotas. Even then, the Dakotas would not join Kramer without a recording contract of their own. Once in place, the deal was set and both acts signed to Parlophone. Collectively, they were named Billy J. Kramer with The Dakotas to keep their own identities within the act. Once the Beatles broke through, the way was paved for a tide of Merseybeat and Kramer was offered the chance to cover Do You Want to Know a Secret? first released by the Beatles on their own debut album, *Please Please Me*. After releasing We're **Doing Fine** in 1966, which missed the charts, the singer and group parted company. Kramer then had a solo career over the next ten to fifteen years or so working in cabaret and in late 2012, Billy went back into the studio for the first time in years to record a CD to be released in early 2013. The CD is entitled I Won the Fight and features some new songs written by Billy as well as some covers. The Dakotas re-formed in the late 1980s and they still tour and record today.

The Animals were a British band formed in Newcastle upon Tyne during the early part of the 60s. The band moved to London on finding fame in 1964. The Animals were known for their gritty, bluesy sound and deep-voiced frontman Eric Burdon, as exemplified by their signature song and transatlantic No.1 hit single, The House of the Rising Sun, as well as by hits such as We Gotta Get out of This Place, It's My Life, and Don't Let Me Be Misunderstood. The band balanced tough, rock-edged pop singles against rhythm and blues-oriented album material. The Animals underwent numerous personnel changes in the mid-1960s and suffered from poor business management. Under the name Eric Burdon and the Animals, the much-changed act moved to California and achieved commercial success as a psychedelic and hard rock band with hits like San Franciscan Nights, When I Was Young and Sky Pilot, before disbanding at the end of the decade. The original lineup had brief comebacks in 1975 and 1983. There have been several partial regroupings of the original era members since then under various names.

The Honeycombs were an English beat/pop group, founded in 1963 in North London. The group had one chart-topping hit, the million selling *Have I the Right?* in 1964. After that song the interest in the group ebbed away, and they split up in late 1966. The group's most distinguishing mark was their female drummer, Honey Lantree.

Sonny & Cher were an American pop music duo made up of husband-and-wife team Sonny and Cher Bono in the 1960s and 1970s. The pair first achieved fame with two hit songs in 1965, Baby Don't Go and I Got You Babe. They released three studio albums in the late 1960s, as well as the soundtrack recording for an unsuccessful movie, Good Times. The couple's career as a duo ended in 1975 following their divorce. In the decade they spent together, Sonny and Cher sold 80 million records worldwide. Performing under her first name, Cher went on to a highly successful career as a solo singer and actress, while Sonny Bono was eventually elected to Congress as a Republican U.S. Representative from California. The two performers were inducted to the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 1998, right after Sonny's death in a skiing accident.

Twiggy is an English model, actress and singer. In the mid-1960s she became a prominent British teenage model of swinging sixties London with others such as Penelope Tree. Twiggy was initially known for her thin build (thus her nickname) and her androgynous look consisting of large eyes, long eyelashes, and short hair. In 1966, she was named "The Face of 1966" by the Daily Express and voted British Woman of the Year. By 1967, Twiggy had modeled in France, Japan, and the US, and landed on the covers of Vogue and The Tatler. Her fame had spread worldwide. After modeling, Twiggy went on to enjoy a successful career as a screen, stage and television actress. She has hosted her own series, Twiggy's People, in which she interviewed celebrities, and also appeared as a judge on the reality show America's Next Top Model. Her 1998 autobiography, Twiggy in Black and White, entered the bestseller lists. Since 2005, she has modeled for Marks and Spencer, most recently to promote their recent rebranding, appearing in television advertisements and print media.
