

CHAIRMAN'S LETTER



I am very pleased, on the behalf of the Mitre Players, to welcome you to the Minack Theatre, which has one of the most scenic theatrical backdrops in the world!

The Mitre Players are an amateur group, initially established in the 1940's and then in their present form in 1973. We are based in Croydon, Surrey, and enjoy involvement in many types of Theatre. We have presented a touring show during the summer, in some part of the south west of England, for many years now and we are delighted to once again be visiting the unrivalled Minack Theatre.

This is the sixth time The Mitre Players have performed at the Minack. Tonight's show, is a creative adaptation of Lewis Carroll's poem,

The Hunting of the Snark – An Agony in Eight Fits, by Mike Batt, to whom we are indebted for permission to perform the world amateur premiere of this imaginative show. 'Previews' for the show are being staged, prior to our run at the Minack, at our home base in Croydon.

Our next production, in October, is **Stepping Out**, for which preparations are already under way. We are also looking forward to our Christmas Pantomime, which, as is tradition with the Mitres. will once again be written by "The Broker" and "The Bellman". This year it is based around the story of Robinson Crusoe. Also, look out for us next summer at the Shaftesbury Theatre, Dawlish, where we will be performing another musical sometime during August.

Tonight's show has been in preparation for over three months and has been great fun for cast and crew alike. The unusual costumes, set and original music have all presented their own challenges. We hope you, our audience, all have an enjoyable evening watching today's performance, in this unrivalled setting.

LEWIS CARROLL - AN INSPIRATION

Lewis Carroll had a wonderfully clear and logical way of approaching nonsense. He wrote many letters to his young friends, where his practical approach to the absurd was evident. He wrote to one of them, saying, "Thank you for the peaches. They were delicious, almost as delicious as kissing you, but not quite. I think if I had to give the exact measurement, I should say 'three quarters'". Carroll, whether he meant to be or not. was never a "children's" writer. His surreal imagination led him, like Alice, down dark paths which brought him to stranger places and into contact with more interesting characters than would have been the case had he been pitching solely to an audience of children.

"It is not children who ought to read Lewis Carroll", wrote Gilbert Chesterton, "they are far better employed making mud pies". Of course, Chesterton was wrong too. Children often appreciate the adult side of Carroll more perceptively than adults. Adults sometimes forget, or are too preoccupied to think deeply enough or with curiosity, whereas children always want to know reasons. They are therefore fascinated when the reasons are hidden or non-existent.

So if children appreciate the adult side of Carroll, and adults are reduced to appreciating the childish side, he has worked on us a particularly typical Carrollean trick. In approaching

Snark as a theatrical piece. I had to decide how much to deviate from Carroll's text and style. It became clear to me that setting his verse to music would force the music into a regular discipline of metre which I was not prepared to accept. All the tunes would have the same "umpty-tumpty" gait. So I decided to write new lyrics and not mix them with Carroll, in song. Whenever spoken verse is used it is pure Carroll, Whenever anything is sung,

new lyrics are used. I rationalise this by considering myself to be an illustrator or interpreter of Carroll, rather than presuming to add or change his work. Consequently, he talks in his language, and I talk in mine. It is a respectful conversation. although of course I would admit that he does not have much choice in the matter. That passiveness on his part is really what has sustained my constant effort to keep to a form or style he might have liked. If he is floating around somewhere, listening, I would like him not to be displeased with what is happening.

All the characters whose names begin with the letter "B" are his inventions, except the Bishop, so he would be constantly aware of the theological and philosophical possibilities of Carroll's inert allegory.

MIKE BATT



MIKE BATT is one of Britain's best-known songwriter/ composers. His consistent track record of success includes production. composition and conducting on projects as diverse as Watership Down (music and lyrics to Art Garfunkel's international number one single. Bright Eyes), Phantom of The **Opera** (producing, co-writing with Andrew Lloyd Webber and orchestrating the first hit) and a great deal of symphonic work, including many television and film scores. He is the only composer ever to have won the Ivor Novello Award for 'Best Film Music' two years in succession, once with Watership Down and once with *Caravans* (the epic adaptation of James Michener's novel, starring Anthony Quinn). He has conducted many of the world's great orchestras including the London Symphony, The London Philharmonic. The Royal Philharmonic, The Sydney Symphony Orchestra, the State Orchestra of Victoria and The National Symphony Orchestra Of Ireland. He has also had successes as a stage

and TV designer and director, having developed a unique system of animation design for live theatre and television productions.

His first hits as a singer/song-writer/producer were by The Wombles, in 1974. After eight hit singles and four gold albums with The Wombles, he moved on to work with Steeleye Span (*All Around My Hat*), the Kursall Flyers (*Little Did She Know*), Elkie Brookes (*Lilac Wine*), Barbara Dickson (*Caravan Song*) and Art Garfunkel (*Bright Eyes*) all of which were top five in at least the UK.

In 1983 Mike wrote and produced three more top ten hits, *Please Don't Fall In Love* (for Cliff Richard), *A Winter's Tale* (for David Essex, with lyrics co-written by Tim Rice) and *I Feel Like Buddy Holly* (for Alvin Stardust).

The first *Snark* album was recorded in 1984, featuring Art Garfunkel, Cliff Richard, Deneice Williams, Captain Sensible, John Hurt, Sir John Gielgud, Roger Daltrey, Julian Lennon, Stephane Grappelli

and George Harrison. It was the first step towards a full dramatic treatment. *The Hunting Of The Snark* was then successfully presented as a dramatised concert at Sydney's State Theatre with the Elizabethan Symphonia in 1990, and was produced as a musical in London's West End in 1991 with Mike designing and directing.

In 1990 he was appointed by the then Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher as a member of the Government Working Group for music in the school curriculum. He then produced, arranged and conducted the *Cover Shot* album by David Essex (top three in the UK albums chart) and recorded his Symphonic Suite *The Dreamstone* with the LPO.

Mike composed and produced the four million-selling album The *Violin Player* with classical violinist Vanessa Mae (EMI Classics, 1995) from which the top ten single *Toccata and Fugue in D minor* was taken.

In 1998, Mike produced, arranged and conducted the album, *Philharmania* with the RPO and guest singers included

Roger Daltrey, Marc Almond, Bonnie Tyler, Status Quo, Huey Lewis, Kim Wilde, Justin Hayward and many others. Also in 1998, he relaunched The Wombles pop group, with two hits, *Remember You're A Womble* (at number 13) and *The Wombling Song* (at number 22) as well as producing the new music for the ongoing 52 part Womble series

After conceiving and co-creating the all-girl string quartet **Bond**, and producing their first single, he then created the eight-piece classical crossover band **The Planets**. Their album **Classical Graffiti** was released in February 2002 and went straight to number one (classical charts) on the day of release and remained there for three months.

Currently, he is dedicating most of his time to guiding the career of 19 year-old *Katie Melua* from Georgia (part of the former USSR). Katie's debut album *Call Off The Search*, has achieved quadruple platinum status in the UK, having sold 1.2 million records.



PROGRAMME NOTE FROM MIKE BATT

Since the staging of the Snark in 1991, there have been many requests for me to give my blessing to amateur or semi-pro productions, but I have been reluctant to make it available because our original production was so unusual in its style that a great deal of written direction and description would be

needed, – and there is also a reluctance to restrict people, whether performers or directors. Some of the unusualness of our production was spontaneous, but nevertheless essential to the piece, and some of it was not essential. Who is to say which is which?

However, when I was requested by the Mitre Players to grant the rights, I decided that this was the moment to formalise some of that written material and to publish a printed version of the score, libretto and other essentials.

It is a very delicate and changeable entity, this piece of theatre. It should allow plenty of scope for the imagination of those involved, but hopefully in a way which allows the original piece to flourish in a manner similar to the piece we created at the Prince Edward. I have a feeling that the Mitre Players understand this very well and that they will deliver an intriguing and energetic version.



She has thoroughly enjoyed working with a very astute director, Helen O'Gorman, and accomplished musical director, Andy Rapps, not to mention the vast army of very talented Mitres who have beavered away so diligently behind the scenes. Helen's work has been seen in various theatres in the South East.



PAUL BOWLES (Designer) Paul's last appearance for the Mitres was as a member of the Royal Household in *The Madness of George III*. Previous appearances have included Jackdaw/Barnacles in *Honk!* (2002) and Evans in *The Long the Short and the Tall* (2002). He has designed and painted the set for several Mitre productions, namely *Beauty and the Beast, Peggy for You* and, most recently, *Peter Pan.* Paul would like to thank all the crew who have helped him 'realise' the set and the costumes.



ANDREW TREWHELLA (Associate Musical Director) left Croydon in 1995, having been a member of staff at Trinity School. Since then he has lived and worked in Somerset where he is Director of Music at Wellington School. Despite the distance factor, he has somehow maintained active links with the Mitre Players and has most recently co-MD'd their touring productions of *Return to the Forbidden Planet* and the award-winning *Honk!*. He is particularly excited to be involved in the amateur premiere of *The Hunting of the Snark* and to be reviving his celebrated double-act with the other Andy! Andrew has been involved (in a variety of musical roles) in every Mitre musical at the Minack – he even learned to play the timps for *Man of la Mancha!* Passionate about musical theatre, Andrew has established a strong tradition of musicals at Wellington and most recently MD'd the school's acclaimed production of *Les Miserables*.



JOHN SHEPHERD (Lewis Carroll) is making his debut with the Mitre Players but his second appearance at the Minack Theatre. Three years ago he played Sir Andrew Aguecheek in the Miller Centre Players' production of *Twelfth Night*. He is also a member of Sanderstead Dramatic Club and has played Dame in their last few pantomimes – a show to rival even the Mitres' renowned productions. Altogether now: 'Oh no it isn't!' 'Oh yes it is!'



COLIN WARNOCK (Bellman) attended Trinity School many years ago and was a founder member of the Mitre Players in 1973 – since then he has been involved in most of their shows as an actor, Musical Director or Composer (qv Broker!). Here at the Minack he was The Man, Cervantes, in *Man of La Mancha*; Frollo in *Quasimodo* and Drake and the Bullfrog in *Honk!*. Other favourite roles include Fagin in *Oliver*, Nathan Detroit in *Guys and Dolls*, Emcee in *Cabaret* and Charley in *Merrily We Roll Along*. Recent Musical Director credits include *Copacabana, Guys and Dolls, Jesus Christ Superstar* and *Godspell*; not forgetting *Beauty and the Beast, Peter Pan* and the forthcoming *Robinson Crusoe* (with the Broker again!!). For the past twenty years Colin has worked at the prestigious Laine Theatre Arts College for the Performing Arts in Epsom helping to train the stars of tomorrow; and whose shows he regularly visits (with the Broker!!!) from The National Theatre's *Funny Thing Happened* to *Saturday Night Fever* and *We Will Rock You*. So "ask not for whom the Bellman toils; he toils for these!"





KAREN RAPPS (Beaver) is thrilled to be playing a 'nice beaver' (no more jokes please) and would like you to know that she has spent several agonising minutes researching her character. This is her third Mitre outing to the Minack, having last appeared as Paquette, a demented old hag, in *Quasimodo* (1997). How things have changed! In real life, she is the beautiful mother of two beautiful girls, Ellie (three years) and Rebecca (one year).



JAMES SMOKER (Butcher) Although he has a filthy penchant for Beaver, James reckons that it's no worse than the Koreans liking dog. He has enjoyed wielding his cleaver with relish whilst waltzing, and playing wantonly with his ball during the euphemistic "Snookering You" number. Croydon audiences might also recognise him from *Bye Bye Birdie* (Conrad), *Godspell* (Our Lord Jesus Christ) and *Peter Pan* (Pirate 5), whilst Minack regulars will, of course, recognise him from The Barnstormers' production of *Into the Woods* seen earlier this year.



KEITH ROBERTSHAW (Baker) is skipping years of fun, laughter and tears in the world of amateur theatre and will ignore all the rules of writing a biog to leave you marooned in the dark. Suffice it to say that he is not RADA trained but that much you could probably tell. If you can't quite place where his accent is aimed, does 'above Watford Gap' ring a bell?



DAVE PRICE (Banker) is one of the few cast members to have seen the original West End production of *The Hunting of the Snark* and has spent the last twelve years scouring the country to find a production of it to be in. If he knew he was going to end up with the Mitre Players he may have thought twice or even once! Seriously though, Dave is delighted to have found his Snark, delighted to be performing at the Minack again after ten years and is looking forward to milking those immortal words *'Twas brillig...'* for all they're worth!




KATY DAVIES (Barrister) must be a glutton for punishment having agreed to do two shows at the Minack this year (think of those quads!) having previously appeared in *Into the Woods* as the Baker's wife. She like the ethos of the Barrister, ie, she thinks she should be paid £200 for every hourly contribution she has made to this production. In her spare time Katy is a doctor.



JOLYON ROBERTS (Billiard Marker) Following a long succession of 'character' parts Jolyon decided a change of image was necessary for this production. He auditioned to play the rich one, the academic one, the leader, the married one, the psychotic one and the sexy one. Instead he got to play the lecherous one in the shiny waistcoat – go figure! Following last year's tour to the West Country, scones were flown in from all over Britain to meet Jolyon's cream tea habit. If all goes to plan in the tea shops this year then future parts will include the enormous, inanimate one! Pass the jam!



JULIAN CHENERY (Broker) Though recently described in the Daily Mail as the 'literary equivalent of McDonald's', but as someone who thinks of himself more as a 'West Cornwall Pasty Company' sort of guy – he's still clever enough to know that Lewis Carroll was bonkers! He writes pantomimes with the Bellman and, like the Bellman, is unlikely ever to tread the boards again having been traumatised by the whole experience. Believe it or not, he is a writer, actor, director and producer for theatre and film.



JOHN SPELLER (Bishop) This is John's first appearance with the Mitre Players and he is looking forward to it, especially the Minack experience. He has played a variety of roles over the years – our Director, Helen, was in fact his leading lady in *Oklahoma* many moons ago! Having been a dustman (*My Fair Lady*), a Beadle, Mr. Bumble (*Oliver*) and a King (*King & I*) he now finds himself as a Bishop with a propensity for pink Teddy Bears! Must be a sign of something!



LORRAINE TITCHENER (Bonnet Maker) has never played a nimble-fingered woman on stage before and is delighted to have been given the opportunity to do so. She is doing this show because she feels her life is not busy enough. She has just run The London Marathon, completed her first year as a newly qualified teacher and is getting married the week after the show closes at The Minack Theatre. Lorraine is marrying the Banker, but would like to stress that she is not marrying him for his money. Boom! Boom! She hopes you enjoy the show and has just one thing to say: if anybody discovers what a Snark is, can they alert a cast member immediately!



MORVEN RAE (Baker's Wife/Company) When Morven first read *The Hunting of the Snark* she became captivated by the characters, the situations in which they found themselves, and, most of all, by the words. Some would say that it takes a nonsensical person to appreciate a nonsensical work – this may well be true. She also became captivated by the Minack Theatre the first time she saw it, so is thrilled to be taking part in her third show there (two this year) and combining both obsessions.



(Soloist & Company) Megan 'Blond Girl' H-R has been a regular sucker to amateur dramatics ever since she was a little girl. She has played many roles, ranging from the all-singing, all-dancing Dainty June in **Gupsy** to the love-struck, Shakespearean role of Juliet in Romeo and Juliet. However, in this particular production she has enjoyed not having any lines to learn and having to use her imagination in playing certain

parts such as a rock and the

sea. She will soon begin

rehearsals for the role of

Polly in *The Boufriend*.



JAMES BEAL (Soloist and Company) 2004 is turning out to be a far-too-busy year for Jimbo. The Hunting of The Snark will be his fifth show this year (and frankly, stupidly his third musical in the month of July alone). He started the year being violently flung around the Big School stage as Peter Pan, his tender areas protected from a razor sharp harness only by a skimpy pair of green tights. He wore a far less revealing costume in April as Musical Director of the junior production of Little Shop of Horrors, but sadly The Hunting of the Snark costume plot calls for him to wear no less than two different leotards. The one with tiger-stripes is his favourite. Elsewhere this year Jimbo has musical directed Fings Ain't Wot They Used T'Be. The Wiz and Zombie Prom. He's also been involved with an assortment of revues and showcases as part of his work with students on the Musical Theatre course at Carshalton College, where he has somehow become the resident musician bloke. Jimbo cannot dance.

OLIVIA CHENERY (Company) Trainee supermodel, film star and millionaire Olivia is keen to follow her father's footsteps into the entertainment business but notes that he is neither handsome, famous or rich. She is thus honing her talents with the Mitres including appearances here at the Minack in Honk!, and in the past year or so in Bye Bye Birdie, Beauty and the Beast, Peter Pan and Little Shop of Horrors - and Cabaret (with Oxted school).


KATHERINE BOTTOMLEY (Soloist & Company) Although a Mitre for 11 years, this is Katherine's first tour since 1999 as she is usually away rafting the Amazon or learning how to be a game ranger – any elephants to track in Cornwall? She is looking forward to playing Andy in *Stepping Out* in the autumn.

FIONA LILLEY (Company) Having not done a Mitre show for a while, Fiona is enjoying being in a show playing so many characters. Her favourite of all of these is "a Rock" which she has been practising on both of her children. Neither are that impressed, so perhaps she needs to go to more rehearsals!

MICHELLE EARL (Company) is an excited Mitre Virgin who's not quite sure what she's getting into! She flew through the audition, as she did on ITV's Soap Stars! This time she has made the final cut and hopes her ancient knowledge of dance comes back!



CAMILLA ROCKLEY (Company) is thrilled at the prospect of wearing four very different leotards during the show, as well as a lycra body bag. With no fewer than 12 costume changes during the proceedings, they might need to zip her up in it by the time she's finished.
