

The action of the play, which is virtually continuous, takes place in the Mayalan jungle during the Japanese advance on Singapore early in 1942.

It is afternoon and the Japanese are being held by British forces twenty miles to the north.

The Director Writes.....

I remember reading Willis Hall's 'The Long and the Short and the Tall' when I was school. I was reading Private Evans with an absolutely execrable Welsh accent but it struck me as a particularly powerful play even at the tender age of fourteen. Willis Hall's construction of the play, his development of situation, the vividness and subtlety of his characters and his observation of relationships are so masterful that to a certain extent, the play looks after itself. Very handy when you're a first time Director! So when I was asked to suggest some plays that I might like to direct, despite other suggestions for the sake of form, 'The Long and the Short and the Tall' was really the only choice I wanted to make.

So having brashly and probably naively said that I would direct it, along came the tricky bit - directing the bloomin' thing. Upon closer inspection, I realised the extent to which the play stopped looking after itself and it occurred to me that we were going to have to do some work. At this point, I really would like to thank the cast for all the work they've done. Far from being stereotypes, the characters and the relationships

between them are incredibly complicated and open to a fair amount of interpretation so I cannot possibly take the credit for our success (or otherwise!) in exploring these. The guys, along with Julia Gibbs and Lorraine Titchener, have put in a fabulous amount of effort into working on this constantly evolving process.

The play is set in a distant storehut in the Malayan Jungle just prior to the Japanese invasion of Singapore. In effect, this means that apart from the more seasoned Sergeant Mitchem and Corporal Johnstone, none of the rest of the men has had any experience of war and certainly no contact with the enemy. The men stumble on this hut whilst on routine patrol and the action unfolds from here.

Thanks to everyone who has been involved, both in the thick of it, and doing the small tedious jobs which, criminally sometimes, can go unnoticed but without which disaster would ensue.

We've all enjoyed ourselves and we hope you do too. But remember one thing - we've got the guns!

Nicholas Uglow, Japanese Soldier


