Of course at that moment I had not the foresight to anticipate the problems. Adults can't rehearse at 4pm, some younger boys cannot

rehearse late in the evenings - boys 'rehearse' with a noticeably different attitude to grown ups and of course are not immediately as articulate as the experienced Mitre Players may be.

Nevertheless it is with enormous pride that we present to you this evening the first ever fully joint production. Boys and members auditioned and have been cast according to age, size, voice and after three months hard work we hope you enjoy the end product.

For us in the Drama Department, it has been a new learning experience. This is our second musical in recent months which the boys have enjoyed enormously. Dance and show-biz harmony were foreign territory to plenty of us nine months ago. Now we can hardly keep them still and everyone wants to do 'West Side Story'.

The boys have benefitted greatly from the enthusiasm and considerable skills of the Mitre Players' members, and have remarked on their abilities. We hope also that the members of the society have enjoyed the youthful exuberance of our boys, even if they didn't listen to every word of the MD or choreographer!

It is our hope that the Mitre Players will continue to support school drama, as they have done for many years, and that some boys will help to lower the average age of the society by joining in some of their frequent productions, as they slowly put their school years behind them.

Enjoy the show.

CHAIRMAN'S LETTER



Good evening and welcome to 'Turnabout'. This show is special in a number of ways, not least because it is the first joint venture between the school and the

Mitre Players. It is also the final production of 1998, the society's 25th anniversary year.

The Mitre Players are, for those for whom this is their first exposure to the society, the drama section of 'The Old Mid-Whitgiftian Association', the old boys organisation of Trinity School. The society was re-formed in 1973 by a group of school leavers who had greatly enjoyed their drama when at school. Leading lights in that reformation were Colin Warnock and Martin Tyrrell who wrote the show you will see tonight.

'Turnabout' was originally performed in Big School in January 1977 and was the fourth in what has now become an established tradition of large scale extravaganzas at Christmas, using the magnificent facilities at Shirley Park. All the shows performed have been written by members or friends of the company and all the music has been original.

Over the years the society has performed a wide range of shows from small scale revues, put on at the OMWA Clubhouse at Lime Meadow Avenue, to mammoth musicals at the famous Minack Theatre in Cornwall. We also competed in a local full length drama festival every year from our first entry in 1977 until its eventual demise in 1996. We won at our first attempt with 'Abelard and Heloise' and with 'What The Butler Saw' at the final festival: in between we won another five times.

All our productions are set out on the back of the programme, if for no other reason than to prove that we have indeed been active for a quarter of a century. This year has been remarkable for that reason if for no other and to celebrate we have had as active a year as any in our history. No less than six productions will have been completed by the end of 1998, bringing our total to 106 since we were reborn. For those of you who would like a permanent reminder of all 25 years there are a number of stocking fillers available which you can buy today before you leave. I especially recommend the C.D. 'It's Only The Mitre Players' containing extracts from all the Christmas shows and much more.

We began this year with our Christmas pantomime 'Robin Hoodlum' shortly followed by our entry into the one-act drama festival at Betchworth, an original play 'Double Fantasy' repeated at the clubhouse the following week. To mark the 25th anniversary the musical version of 'Charley's Aunt', 'Where's Charley?' was performed in the same week as 'Charley's Aunt' had been in 1973, again at the clubhouse. The rehearsals for 'Merrily We Roll Along' then began. This had a run at the clubhouse

before going on tour to Dawlish. Once the set for that had been stored, the preparation for 'The Cherry Orchard' got under way. That production in turn overlapped with the beginning of rehearsals for tonight's show.

I think this demonstrates as well as anything the wide variety of the society's activities in the dramatic field.

The diversity of activity reflects the diversity of interest and talent in the group and also represents the range of opportunity available to potential members. We are always very anxious to encourage new members (especially young ones) through links with the school and hope the experience of working with us on 'Turnabout' will encourage some of the boys involved to join us for future productions. We are primarily a society for erstwhile Trinity boys, together with friends and relations but do have members who have no direct connection with the school and there is absolutely no qualification required to come and watch. If you would like to know more about us or to be put on our mailing list, there are leaflets in the fover which will enable you to do just that.

As for tonight we hope you will enjoy the combined efforts of The Mitre Players and Trinity School in 'Turnabout'.
