

Director's Note

"The power of population is indefinitely greater than the power in the earth to produce subsistence for man"

- Thomas Malthus (1766-1834)





Urinetown: the Musical is set in a dystopian, not-too-distant future where a prolonged drought has caused a water shortage so severe that people have to pay to pee. And you can't just go in the bushes – there's laws against it. In fact these laws are so severe that the punishment for breaking them is banishment to the infamous Urinetown, a place you definitely do not go for a short visit.


It opened on Broadway in 2001 and earned Mark Hollmann's music



and lyrics, and Greg Kotis' book and lyrics Tony Awards in 2002 for Best Book of a Musical and Best Original Score, also collecting the Tony for Best Direction of a Musical. It wasn't until 2014 that Jamie Lloyd brought the show to the West End where it ran for less than a year, despite receiving critical acclaim for its staging and sharp satire. Perhaps people didn't want to be told that their way of life was unsustainable... or maybe it's just because the title is terrible!

It has been a real pleasure exploring this off-the-wall piece and a lot of that pleasure has come from the people involved. I really can't thank Penny and Robert enough for their commitment, patience and sheer talent, and the cast who have worked so hard to pull off some really challenging music and choreography. Not to mention all the consummate not-professionals-but-probablyshould-be behind the scenes at the Mitre Players who bring together set, props, costumes, lighting, sound, front-of-house and everything else that contributes to making what I hope will be a fabulous evening.

About the show



A Musical About Toilets... Really? Welcome to Urinetown: The Musical

Yes, you read that right.
A musical about toilets.
But *Urinetown* is so
much more than that –

it's a wildly inventive, razorsharp satire wrapped in the trappings of a classic Broadway show.

Born from an American writer's bemused encounter with a pay-to-pee toilet on a trip to Europe, *Urinetown* imagines a dystopian, Gotham-like city crippled by a 20-year drought. Water is scarce, private toilets are outlawed, and citizens must pay to use public amenities owned by a corrupt mega-corporation. Out of this absurd premise came one of Broadway's most daring and original musicals in years.

Premiering in 2001, *Urinetown* became the unexpected hit of the season. It garnered ten Tony Award nominations and won three – for Best Score, Best Book, and Best Direction. Bruce Weber of The

New York Times called it "a sensational piece of performance art... one that acknowledges theatre tradition and pushes it forward." Rex Reed of The New York Observer praised it as "fresh, unique, original, impudent, colourful, exciting, irreverent, surprising and wonderful."

Its Broadway opening was scheduled for September 2001 – but in a twist eerily echoing its own dark humour, it was delayed in the wake of the 9/11 attacks.

Though written before those events, the show's sharp satire of corporate greed and government overreach took on even more relevance in the years that followed.

Urinetown stands proudly in a long tradition of theatre that isn't afraid to make audiences laugh and think. In the spirit of Bertolt Brecht and The Threepenny Opera, it uses humour, parody, and theatrical self-awareness to ask serious questions about power, privilege, and public responsibility.

So yes – it's a musical about toilets. But it's also a brilliantly subversive, smart, and shockingly relevant piece of theatre.

We're thrilled to welcome you to Urinetown. Just... be careful where you pee.

Hail Maithus!

When Officer Lockstock cries "Hail, Malthus!" near the end of *Urinetown*, it's more than just a dramatic flourish. It's a nod to Thomas Robert Malthus (1766–1834), an English scholar best known for his grim predictions about overpopulation.

In his 1798 essay On the Principle of Population, Malthus argued that while populations grow exponentially,

resources like food and water increase only arithmetically. The result? Sooner or later, humanity would outstrip its ability to sustain itself, leading inevitably to poverty, famine, and disease.




To prevent catastrophe, Malthus

proposed strict measures: abstinence before marriage, punishments for "irresponsible" parenthood, and even forced sterilisation – ideas that were controversial even in his own time.

Malthusian thinking has influenced many debates on population control and

resource management. Advocates point to events like the 1918–1922 influenza pandemic (which killed an estimated 75 million people worldwide) as grim evidence of natural "population checks."

Urinetown takes these bleak ideas and runs with them – all the way to a payper-use toilet block – turning Malthus's warnings into darkly comic commentary on capitalism, control, and the cost of survival.



"Instead of recommending cleanliness to the poor, we should encourage contrary habits. We should crowd more people into houses... and court the return of the plague."




GARETH THOMAS


